24 Rounds Of Fighting On Tonight's Bill

Fans Offered Fine Card Headlined By Bobby Volk And Sonny Orrock

Twenty-four rounds of lively action are listed for tonight's fight card at the Roseburg Armory. The boxing show starts promptly at 8:30 p.m.

The promoters have taken top Douglas County boxing talent and mixed them up with equally sharp performers from other Northwest spots. The combination adds up to one colorful card, certain to please the most blasé customer.

Tonight's card features the following participants:

In the main event, Bobby Volk, Portland, opposes Sonny Orrock, Spokane. These middleweight lads are scheduled to go 10 rounds. Volk, the battler, faces Orrock, the showman. Reports are that "anything can happen."

Billy Pappas, popular Salt Lake City slugger, opposes Ponce DeLeon, a newcomer from Aberdeen, Wash. They battle in a scheduled six-round semi-final. Both are listed as middleweights.

Probably attracting as much interest as the top portion of the card will be a four-rounder featuring Douglas County's Dick Collie in a return match with Sonny Elexman of Spokane. Listed as welterweights, both boys were voted by fans' applause to be the best preliminary performers on the card of three weeks ago.

The curtain goes up on another Douglas County lad, Lyle Wescott of the Roseburg National Guard. He battles Spokane's Pete Greco, who fought Lloyd Smith to a draw here two weeks ago. They weighed in as lightweights.

Red Green will referee the bouts and Mayor Albert G. Flegel probably will orate the events.

Albany Qualifies 8 For State Prep Track Meet

CORVALLIS, Ore., May 13.—Albany became the District 3 favorite here yesterday, qualifying in eight events for the state high school track meet.

Albany won the district meet handsily, scoring 115 points. Corvallis had 99, Newport 72, Independence 41, Dallas 28, Toledo 7, Sweet Home 6, Taft 1.

Newport qualified in six events for the state meet, Corvallis in four, Lebanon three, Dallas and Independence one each.

In Class B competition Harrisburg won with 135 points. Monthouth had 93, Shedd 69, Berrydale 31, Falls City and Eddyville 23, Sleitz 14 and Alsea 10.

The schools cracked ten district records, six of them by Class B teams.

Parnell Hurls Bosox To Win Over Chicago

Trucks Of Detroit Snaps Washington Win Streak; Cincy Blanks N. Y. Giants

Mel Parnell's pitching is the only bright spot in the dreary spring showing of the mighty Boston Red Sox.

It took Parnell's brilliant 11-inning victory over Chicago yesterday to pull the Sox up even with last year's sorry opening month.

Down south the wise guys said "Boston can't possibly get off as slowly as last year." They were wrong. As of today Boston has a 9-11 record. Last May 13 their win and lost totals were exactly the same.

Parnell struck out 11 White Sox hitters yesterday but needed an 11th inning homer by Vern Stephens to get off the hook. It was his fourth victory.

Washington's nine-game winning streak finally was snapped by Detroit's Virgil Trucks, 2-1. Don Kolloway, who joined the Tigers Sunday in a trade with Chicago, blasted two doubles and a triple off Walt Masterson. Trucks' five-hitter was his fifth triumph of the season.

The St. Louis Browns blasted three home runs to rout Lou Briesse and the Philadelphia A's, 5-3, for their third straight following a 10-game losing string.

Dick Kokos, Bob Dillinger and Ed Bellagrini hit Briesse's home run ball out of the park.

The New York Yankees and Cleveland were not scheduled. Cincy Blanks Giants

Cincinnati, which stopped the New York Giants' winning surge after seven in a row, made it two straight on a 3-0 shutout by Ken Raffensberger.

Raffensberger's second shutout was a brilliant job. He held the power-hitting Giants to four singles, dropping them into a first place tie with the Boston Braves whose scheduled game with St. Louis was postponed because of wet grounds.

Clint Hartung, who had won his first four, was clipped for eight hits and all the Cincinnati runs in his eighth-inning stretch.

Ralph Branca became the National League's first five-game winner with an 11-5 verdict over Pittsburgh.

Hank Borowy, traded to the Phillies by Chicago last winter, whipped his old Cub mates the first time he faced them, 4-3. Bob Rush gave up only six hits but was hurt by Del Jeffercoat's costly error on Del Ennis' fly that set up the winning score in the sixth.

In the opening inning, the Indians hit pitcher Haskett four times, but seven runs were scored as the entire Roseburg lineup batted around. Three runs were the result of errors. Leo Bowers was hit by a pitched ball and Bobby Sanders got on through a fielder's choice.

Dexter Garey was the first man to score, followed by Bowers, Barry Kenny, Sanders, Neil Wissing, Stan Cornutt and pitcher Sully Sullivan. Wissing and Sullivan each clouted singles.

Two more Indian hits came in the second inning. Diz Burnett and Wissing each singled and Sanders scored after getting on base through an error. Wissing was thrown out going to second.

In the fourth, Roseburg collected three runs and three hits. Sanders, Wissing and Stan Cornutt each scored. Sanders singled and Cornutt whanged out a double, scoring Wissing who firsted on a fielder's choice.

Sullivan tallied the final Roseburg run in the seventh, scoring on Dexter Garey's three-bagger.

Sutherland's two runs came in the third and fifth. Shortstop Erickson singled and scored in the third, and third baseman Hemenyas scored after drawing a base on balls.

The game was marked with many Sutherland errors, which helped Roseburg advance to the next base.
