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Israel Admitted As 59th Member Of United Nations

NEW YORK, May 12. — (AP) — Israel's admission as the 59th member of the United Nations has finally been approved. A simple flag-raising ceremony today winds up the formalities.

The General Assembly approved the Israel application last night by a vote of 3712, with nine countries abstaining.

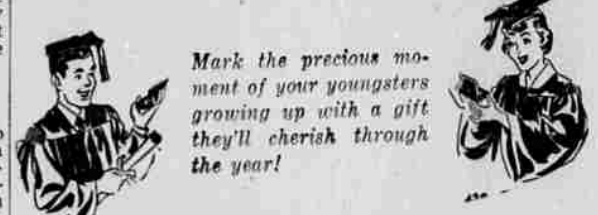
The decision was followed by an Arab walk-out, but some of the Arab countries' representatives returned for a late night meeting, indicating that the protest was ended.

WASHINGTON, May 13. — (AP) —Two four-star generals took time out Thursday to issue this undercover order:

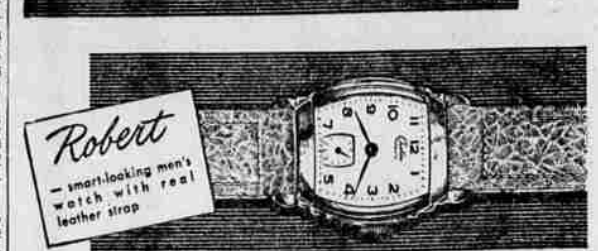
