ASKS EXECUTION STAY—TACOMA, May 14.—(AP)—Jake Bird, convicted Negro slayer whose capers in law have kept him from two court-appointed dates with the gallows, today asked for another stay of execution and a review of his case by filing a petition for a writ of habeas corpus.

The petition was filed before Federal Judge Sam Driver of Spokane, who set a hearing in the U. S. District Court at Yakima for May 20. Bird is scheduled to die May 27.

Eviction Of Actor Charlie Chaplin From U. S. Demanded By Senator Cain

WASHINGTON, May 16.—(AP)—Senator Cain (R-Wash) demanded Friday that screen actor Charlie Chaplin be deported, and accused him of coming "perilously close to treason" against the United States.

In a statement submitted to a Senate Judiciary Committee, Cain said the incident was a year ago when deportation proceedings were brought against Hanns Eisler.

Cain said Chaplin sent Pablo Picasso of France a "treasonable" message, as follows:

"Can you head committee of French artists to protest to the American Embassy in Paris the outrageous deportation proceedings against Hanns Eisler here, and simultaneously send me a copy of protest for use here. Greetings!"

Cain called Picasso a "self-admitted French Communist." Hanns Eisler is a brother of

Gearhart Eisler, who has fled from the United States as a stow-away on a Polish ship.

Hanns Eisler was ordered deported last year. He asked to be allowed to leave this country voluntarily and was given that permission.

Chaplin is a native of England.
