

Protestant Churches of Oregon Aim At Record Evangelistic Campaign

PORTLAND—Plans for "the greatest united evangelistic campaign ever undertaken by the Protestant churches in Oregon," were adopted by the Board of Directors of the Oregon Council of Churches meeting here this week. According to Dr. Walter Giersbach of Forest Grove, president of the Council, efforts will be made to carry the Christian message to virtually every town in Oregon over a 15-months period beginning next October. In the effort Oregon will be cooperating with churches throughout America in the Nationwide Christian Crusade, which begins October 2, 1949.

Through the Oregon Council's Committee on Forestellars hand.

Through the Oregon Council's Committee on Evangelism, headed by Wallace Lee of Portland, an invitation will be extended to every Protestant denomination working in Oregon to join in the united crusade. Communities will cooperate in four types of evangelistic effort designed to reach every home in the community: gelistic effort designed to reach every home in the community:

(1). A united church attendance emphasis to urge every individual to attend "the church of his choice." '2). A Christian teaching mission to locate all persons not connected with any church and to win them through a program of fellowship evangelism. (3). A preaching mission in which outstanding state and national Christian leaders will present Jesus tian leaders will present Jesus Christ as the answer to the deep-est needs of the individual and of the nations. (4). A program of visitation evangelism in which trained teams from the churches will visit in the homes to present the claims of Christ and the




