The community is attempting in its program to symbolize Douglas County's reputation as the timber capital of the nation.

Track Records Fall In Coliseum Relays
LOS ANGELES, May 21.—(AP) Speed and muscle mixed with record-making performances, marked the ninth annual Coliseum relays.

Pell-Mel Patton and his Trojan teammates from the University of Southern California provided the speed.

Mighty Fortune Gordien, with a throw surpassing the American discus record, furnished the muscle.

The Trojan 880-yard sprint relay for the second time in seven days bettered the world record. They spun off the distance in 1 minute, 24 seconds, with Patton, the world's fastest human, clocked in 20 seconds from a running start for his 220-yard anchor explosion.

Last Saturday at Fresno the foursome of George Pasquali, Ronnie Frazier, Norm Stocks and Patton did the 880 in one minute 24.4 seconds. The world record is 1:25 seconds, set by Stanford in 1937.

Gordien, third in the Olympic games last summer and former N.C.A.A. and A.A.U. discus champion, hurled the platter 180 feet, 8 inches. This beat the American record of 180 feet 21 inches set by another Minnesota star, Bob Fitch, in 1946.

OUT OUR WAY Riddle Will Have Modern School

Bids are to be invited early next week for construction of the first wing of a new elementary school at Riddle. Robert A. Miller of Portland is the architect.

The building will be unique in construction and planning. All classrooms will have north light with window walls on the north side with a large overhanging roof. Ceilings will be sloped in from the outside. Construction will be semi-fireproof with pumice block and brick walls and partitions, concrete slab floors, acoustical ceilings and wood roof framing. The primary wing will have complete facilities in each classroom, toilet for boys, toilet for girls, wardrobes, drinking fountain, etc.

An open corridor will be used which will also provide for covered play area.

The primary wing will be isolated from the further intermediate wing by an open play court accessible only from the primary wing.

Tentative plans call for five primary rooms and five secondary, auditorium, gymnasium, library and office suite.

It is hoped to have the first unit ready for use by October 1 of 1950.

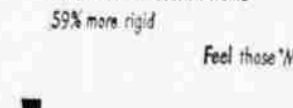

New Business Building Rising At Reedsport

Construction has been started by Nelson Hogan, pioneer Reedsport business man, on his new business building on Fir Avenue, across the street from the Reedsport post office and adjacent to the Schneider building.

The new structure will have only one story and will be built of pumice stone blocks with a cement floor. It will be 50 feet wide and 80 feet long, and have room for two business locations. One will be occupied by the State Liquor store, according to Mr. Hogan, with no occupancy announced for the other room.

The construction firm of Anderson & Morris will assist in putting up the building, but Mr. Hogan plans on doing much of the work himself.

Forms are being put in now for the foundation, and it is hoped to have this work done by the time the Umpqua River Navigation Company has its new red-mix concrete plant in operation, so that the foundation and floors can be poured.

Mr. Hogan was owner and manager of the Reedsport Garage until he sold that business a few years ago.

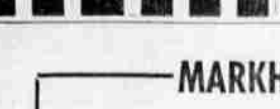
