### Legislative Interim Committees Appointed To Study Oregon Taxes, Highways And College Education

SALEM, May 23 — (AP) — Legislative interim committees to study taxes, highways and college education were appointed Thursday by Senate President William E. Walsh and House Speaker Frank J. Van Dyke. Members of the Tax Study Committee are: Sens. Howard Helton, Canby; and Orval N. Thompson, Albany; and Reps. Giles L. French, Moro, and John I. Sell, The Dalles. Governor McKay also will appoint five advisory members to the Committee. The Highway Committee will continue the study begun by an interim committee created in 1947. Members are Sens. Paul L. Patterson, Hillsboro; Elmo Smith, Ontario and Jack Bain, Portland; and Reps. Max M. Landon, Sweet Home; Ralph T. Moore, Coos Bay; E. A. Geary, Klamath Falls and Vernon Wilson, Lakeview. The College Education Committee will seek to determine if Oregon needs more colleges, with emphasis on whether junior colleges are necessary. Members are Sen. Parkinson, Roseburg; and Reps. J. F. Short, Redmond, and David Baum, LaGrande.

### Spokane Landlords Ask Removal Of Rent Controls

SPokane, May 23 — (AP) — Landlords have asked the Spokane Rent Advisory Board to recommend immediate removal of rent controls in Spokane. One hundred landlords attended a hearing on rent control. Chairman James Dillard asked to hear from a tenant, but none came forward. A. L. Spooner, chairman of the Spokane Property and Home Owners' Association, said there are 1340 vacant housing units in Spokane and 1080 of them are being withheld from the market by landlords who object to rent control. Frank Jenkins, representing the Spokane Building Owners' and Managers' Association, said he felt patriotic after the war and rented housing to many veterans' families. "I must have been terribly unlucky," he said. "I got an awful bunch. I finally went back to renting to people." The audience applauded and Jenkins added: "I just have been unlucky; I don't mean all veterans are like that."
