

### Portlander Dies Suddenly In His Hotel Room Here

Harry Carlton Hanford, 64, broker of Portland, died suddenly here in his hotel room May 24. Born June 25, 1884, in Onoonta, New York, he had been a resident of Oregon 19 years. He was a member of Westminster Presbyterian Church, Portland; the Masonic Lodge; the Shrine, and was a past exalted ruler of an Elks Lodge in Nebraska.

Surviving are his widow, Mabel E. Hanford, Portland; two daughters, Mrs. William E. Craft, Portland, who will accompany the body to Portland, and Mrs. Ruth Ewan, Portland; a sister, Mrs. James Blair, Binghamton, N. Y., and three grandchildren.

The body will be shipped by the Roseburg Funeral Home to Miller and Tracy Funeral Home in Portland. A double funeral service will be held next week for Hanford and his son, the late Lt. Richard A. Hanford, whose body is being returned from the European Theater. Vault interment will follow in Lincoln Memorial Cemetery, Portland.

### Victor Reuther Shot By Unknown Gunman

through a glass, then fled, witnesses said, in a car.

In bushes near the Victor Reuther home police found a 12-gauge double-barreled shotgun. Both barrels had been fired.

Victor Reuther's shooting followed by 72 hours the mysterious shotgun slaying in neighboring Windsor, Ont., of a rank and file member of the UAW in Canada.

That victim, William D. Allen, 37, also was shot through a window of his home. Allen was an inspector at the Ford Motor Co. of Canada.

Police, however, said they could establish no connection between Allen's slaying and the attempt on Reuther's life, nor any connection with the Ford strike.

Detroit Police Superintendent Edwin Morgan took personal charge of the investigation into Victor Reuther's shooting.

At the same time authorities took precautions to protect a third Reuther brother, Roy, a UAW international representative.

The gunman's blast struck Reuther almost full in the face. One pellet hit him in the neck. He and his wife, Sophie, were sitting in the living room. She sat at the room from him.

"All of a sudden I heard a shot," Mrs. Reuther said. "I saw Victor falling to the floor. His head and face were bleeding badly."

Mrs. Reuther, uninjured, called police.

The medical report said that one shotgun pellet entered the right eye and a second fractured Reuther's right collarbone. Two caused "minor flesh wounds" in the left side of his neck and two others struck him in the right cheek.

Police said the gunman fired from a range of about 15 feet.

peaceful there for most of the city was still asleep. What few Nationalists the Reds encountered there threw down their arms or took to their heels.

Straight for the billion dollar Bund built along the Whangpoo banks they headed. There they ran into trouble. The bridges were blocked by machine guns. Snipers opened up from buildings.

Rifleman in the Broadway Mansions, tall apartment building across Soochow Creek from the heart of Shanghai, kept the Reds low.

Nationalist soldiers barricaded at the Garden Bridge, Chapoo Bridge and the Schechwan Bridge held other Red bands. The bridges lead to the only arteries to Shanghai's north outlet.

The Communists deployed into abandoned Nationalist fortifications on the Bund. They were forced from their advance positions by rifle grenades and machinegun fire from the Garden Bridge park and from the third floor of Broadway Mansions.

When it became apparent the Communists could not take the exposed targets without considerable loss of life, they set up a harassing fire. Bullets crackled up and down the famous Bund, in front of the Glen Line building housing the American Consulate, in front of the British Consulate and across from the Russian Consulate.

Thousands watched the fighting from high buildings on the Bund.

dent Truman wanted for ECA for the 12 months starting July 1. This cut is almost half a billion dollars bigger than was ordered by a subcommittee that wrote the bill.

Offset Suggested  
The administration wants at least the \$4,015,990,000 approved by the subcommittee.

Following a huddle yesterday with Paul G. Hoffman, ECA administrator, Chairman Cannon (D-Mo) of the Appropriations Committee came up with proposal to let ECA use the proposed new funds in a shorter period than the committee has provided.

In addition to the \$3,568,470,000 recommended for the fiscal year beginning July 1, the committee approved \$1,074,000,000—as requested—for the final three months of the present fiscal year, ending June 30. In short, the entire \$4,642,470,000 would be for use over a 15-month period.

Cannon proposed that ECA be allowed, with presidential approval, to spend the whole sum in 12 months if necessary. The effect of that plan, if approved, would be to offset the committee cut.

Hoffman, he said, told him and other committee members the committee cut "would seriously affect the international situation and would be disastrous."

There were no signs though that Republicans would go for the new plan.
