



**WATER RESERVOIR COMPLETED**—A new, 100,000-gallon water reservoir was recently completed at Canyonville. Octagonal in shape, it was designed by James R. Daugherty, Roseburg engineer, as the first of two such reservoirs. Top picture shows the completed reservoir at right, and old 50,000-gallon wood stave reservoir which will be used until the second new tank is constructed. Most walls of the new reservoir are eight-inch thick concrete, heavily reinforced. They were poured monolithic by using special plywood panel forms suspended from a trussed framework. Eighty cubic yards of concrete were used and 13,000 lineal feet of 8-inch reinforcing steel. The concrete tank was designed originally for a steel-framed aluminum roof. The work was done by force account under supervision of Merle Fuller, foreman, when no bids were received by the city. Lower pictures show construction scenes.
