Umpqua's Wolf Creek Camp To Go On Fee Basis

PORTLAND, May 26.—(P)—Twelve national forest campgrounds in Oregon and Washington will operate this summer on a fee basis.

The regional Forest Service office reported today that the fees—50 cents a car for a night's camping and 25 cents a car for picnicking—will go into effect this weekend at McKee Bridge

and Dead Indian Soda Springs Camps in the Rogue River forest. Elsewhere the effective dates will be late June or early July.

The other fee camps are: Camp Creek and Tollgate, Mount Hood; Elk Creek and Siltcoo, Siuslaw; Wolf Creek, Umpqua; Clear Lake and Paradise, Willamette; Government Mineral Springs, Columbia; American River and Naches, Snoqualmie.

Foster Parents Win Fight For Child's Custody

KLAMATH FALLS, May 26.—(P)—Two-year-old Kathleen Eleanor Turvey was formally placed in the care and custody of Mr. and Mrs. Lloyd Peters of Chiloquin Tuesday in an order by Circuit Judge David R. Vandenberg, ending a legal controversy over the child.

The little girl was the central figure in a habeas corpus proceeding brought by her father, George Elliott Turvey, of Las Vegas, Nevada. His attempt to get custody of the child was resisted by Peters, who claimed she was placed in the Peters family with the understanding that adoption would be possible.

Judge Vandenberg took jurisdiction over the child and then placed her in Peters' care. He held that the father was not a fit person to have custody of the child. The judge further held that Turvey gave the Oregon court jurisdiction by bringing the case into this state. A Nevada district court previously had taken jurisdiction over the child.

Peters is justice of the peace at Chiloquin. He testified in the proceedings that Kathleen had been placed in his family through arrangements with Helen Applegate Turvey, ex-wife of the father. Mrs. Turvey claimed the arrangements were only temporary.

Soviet Spy?

American War Novel Under Australian Probe

CANBERRA, Australia, May 26.—(P)—Australia is going to take a careful look at the American war novel "The Naked and the Dead" before deciding whether it can be sold here.

The Customs Department has turned the novel over to the literature censorship board for an opinion and banned entry of the book pending a decision.

The book, by Norman Mailer, tells of G.I.'s fighting on a jungle island north of Australia, using frank "soldier talk" throughout. It has been a best seller in the United States.

The novel caused a minor storm in England recently but Attorney General Shawcross told the House of Commons Monday he would take no legal steps against it in Great Britain. He described the book as "foul, lewd and revolting," but not intended "to corrupt and deprave."

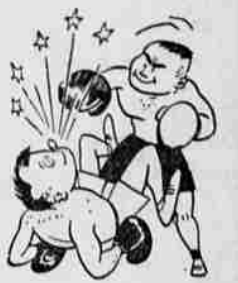

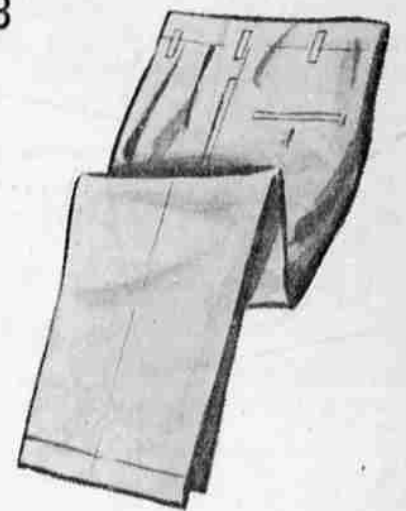
