R. H. S. Band Will Feature Unique Novelty Numbers At Rose Festival In Portland

Almost nightly rehearsals are scheduled by the Roseburg High School band prior to leaving for Portland and the Rose Festival participation, reports Director C. A. Ricketts. The festival dates are June 9, 10 and 11.

Eighty band members, their number augmented to nearly 100 by chaperons, bus drivers, and others scheduled to make the trip, will leave Roseburg Wednesday, June 15, at 5:30 a. m. Expecting to arrive in Portland in the early afternoon, the students have been granted permission to parade through the Portland streets, in and out of the principal business houses, riding the escalators, and all the time playing

music on their instruments. The big event will be the Thursday night territorial band jamboree, featuring major bands from the Pacific Northwest in a gigantic performance in Multnomah Stadium. Included will be bands from all the Portland high schools, Butte, Mont., The Dalles, drum corps, and bands from Klamath Falls and La Grande in Oregon, and several large Washington schools.

The band is rehearsing several numbers or stunts to perform in the big show, said Ricketts. Each band will be given 12 minutes, the same as last year.

Novelties on Program
The first number will be

"Around the clock in Roseburg," in which the bandmen will form a huge clock, with hands moving, all to the tune of "As Time Goes By." Next a novelty number of milking a cow to the tune of "Old Cow Hand," will be presented.

"Cut Down the Old Pine Tree" is the theme of the next number. A log will be formed and sawed in two. A sawdust burner will next be formed. As the stadium lights are turned off, the musicians will have fluorescent tape on their hats to shine in the dark, and smoke will shoot out of the top. The song "Smoke Gets in Your Eyes" will be played. A similar idea will be used in the final formation of a house with the music to be "A Perfect Day."

The big festival parade will be Friday morning, and the band will also participate. Then to compensate for their long periods of drill and performance, the band members will spend Saturday at Jantzen beach.

During their stay in Portland the students will be quartered at Lewis and Clark College.

Woman Files Damage Suit On Assault Claim

Montana Miller Jennings has filed a new complaint in Circuit Court against H. H. Miller as the result of a beating she alleges the defendant administered to her on Aug. 5, 1948. A previously filed suit was ordered dismissed by Judge Carl E. Wimberly, upon motion for voluntary non-suit of the attorney for the plaintiff, and the new complaint was immediately filed.

The plaintiff asks general damages of \$3,000, loss of income of \$600 from her business, while she allegedly was recovering from her injuries, and \$5,000 exemplary and punitive damages.

She alleges that the defendant "wrongfully, unlawfully and violently did assault and batter the plaintiff . . . threaten the plaintiff with a gun, and with his fists did beat, bruise, wound and ill treat the plaintiff, and did strike her on and about various parts of the body and more especially on and about her face, and thereby did blacken her eyes, bruise, discolor and cut open her face; all without provocation or cause."

She claims the facial cut remained open nine weeks, and left a permanent scar, that she was sick for two months and suffered "great bodily pain and discom-

MOSCOW, May 27.—AP.—Soviet Russia ordered yesterday a boost of 50 to 100 percent in delivery of meat, milk and other animal products to the state in the next three years.

At the same time the Communist Party newspaper Pravda said a large amount of the livestock now being delivered is inadequately fattened and the percentage of hogs and chickens is too small.

Other speakers included Sam Reed, in behalf of the Opportunity Bond Drive; Miss Miriam Davis, for the American Legion poppy sale, and Vic J. Micelli, announcing the dedication of the new municipal swimming pool at 7 o'clock tonight.

Reed urged purchase of U. S. savings bonds. He pointed out that labor turnover is a contributing factor to high business overhead costs. Although considerable bookkeeping would be involved, employers should urge employees to purchase bonds by payroll deductions to tide them over periods of low income, when they might look for other employment, Reed declared. Employers would then be saved the cost of training new help.

One of a group of Toastmasters volunteering to speak for the bond drive, Reed was introduced by Rod Neveu, of the Junior Chamber of Commerce, sponsor of the drive in Roseburg.

Miss Davis, Toastmistress volunteering to speak for the American Legion poppy sale, said the local committee hopes to sell "twice as many" as last year. She pointed out that the more poppies sold this year, the more that disabled veterans will be able to make for sale next year. "Let's see that we all wear a poppy Friday and Saturday," she urged.
