Northwest Army Engineers Given New Posts — PORTLAND, May 28. — (P) — Col. O. E. Walsh, Portland District engineer, was promoted Thursday to North Pacific Division engineer, succeeding Col. Theron D. Weaver. Weaver, who has been division head since it was reactivated in 1946, will be reassigned to an overseas post in the European command. The change will take place about July 1. Walsh's successor as district engineer has not yet been named. Col. L. H. Hewitt, Seattle district engineer, was assigned to the Panama Canal Zone. He is being replaced by E. C. Itchner, present head of the engineers' military construction operations in Washington, D. C. Weaver's European job will not be new to him. He served in the European theater during World War II, and after Germany's surrender, had the task of restoring industry to production in the American zone of Germany.

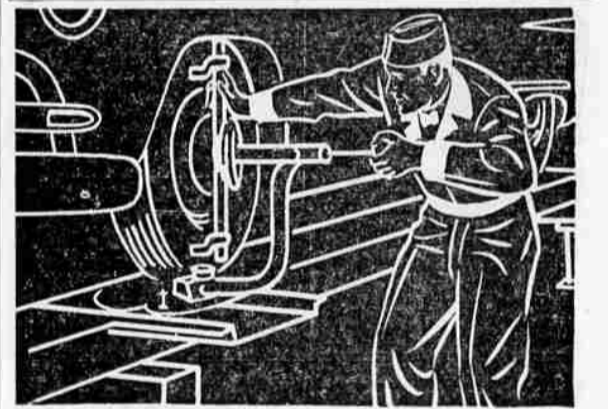
Survivors include the widow, president of the Portland Junior league; a stepson, Joseph Sill; and his mother at La Grande.
