Telephone Rates Increase June 1

SALEM, May 31. — (AP) — A rate increase for the Pacific Telephone & Telegraph Company, expected to total \$3,563,892 annually, was approved Saturday by Public Utilities Commissioner George H. Flagg.

The increase will be effective June 1.

The company had asked a boost of \$3,496,000.

Flagg's order puts about half of the increase on regular residence and business phones and the rest largely on long distance tolls within the state.

Residence phones, one-party line, will go up 75 cents a month at all points served by the company. Two-party line phone charges will go up 50 cents and all other residence phones 25 cents.

Business phones in Portland will draw an added \$2 charge while business phones in other cities generally will go up \$1.

In cities included in group 5, including Albany, Baker, Bend, Grants, P. A. S., Milwaukie-Oak Grove, Oregon City, Pendleton, Roseburg, Seaside, The Dalles and Tillamook, the rate increase will boost one-party residence service to \$4.25 a month, two-party service to \$3.50 a month and four-party service to \$2.75.

Strike At Boeing Plant Illegal, Ruling Of Court

WASHINGTON, May 31. — (AP) — The United States Court of Appeals today ruled that a strike of Boeing Aircraft Company employees at Seattle last year was illegal. It also threw out the Machinists' Lodge 751 as bargaining agent for the firm's 14,500 workers there.

The action overruled a National Labor Relations Board order that the walkout was conducted under provisions of the Taft-Hartley Act and that the union is the legal collective bargaining agent for Boeing workers.

The group involved is the Aeronautical Industrial District Lodge, a branch of the International Association of Machinists.

The three-judge appeals court held unanimously that the union acted unlawfully in not giving Boeing sufficient notice of intent to strike. The court also asserted the walkout, which occurred April 25, 1948, was in violation of a then-effective contract between the union and company.

In presenting its case, the union contended that its 24-hour notice to strike was legal notification that its contract with the company no longer existed. It further declared that the walkout resulted from stalled negotiations over a new agreement to replace one which had expired.

Difference between Boeing and the union which led up to the strike since have been settled. Until today the Lodge had served as representative of Boeing employees.

The court decision gave no effective date of its order.

National officers of the machinists reported they are considering whether to appeal today's decision to the Supreme Court. If they do not do that, they may press for a quick bargaining election by the NLRB.

The machinists union claims a majority of the Boeing workers, despite the fact that the teamsters have members in the plant.

Foreign Aid Fund Bill Will Face Senate Storm

WASHINGTON, May 31. — (AP) — The foreign-aid bill, now at \$5,617,470,000, is in for stormy opposition in the Senate.

Some leaders of both parties have warned they will try to take a substantial slice out of the bill, approved Thursday by the House.

A plea from President Truman saved the measure from a considerable cut on the House side. But members of the Senate Appropriations Committee appeared to be in no mood to heed a similar appeal.

Even Senator McKellar of Tennessee, Democratic chairman of the committee, said the House should have taken a bigger cut of the aid funds.

The \$5,617,470,000 includes funds for the Economic Cooperation Administration; for Greece-Turkey aid; and for government and relief in the occupied areas of Germany, Austria and Japan.

The House lopped \$794,730,000 off the amount President Truman requested. But the members offset this cut largely by making the money available for 13 and one-half months instead of the 15 months in the original plan.

Senator Wherry (R-Nebr.) said the Senate committee will try to make a "real cut."

Senator Russell (D-Ga.) called the House action "just a paper savings."

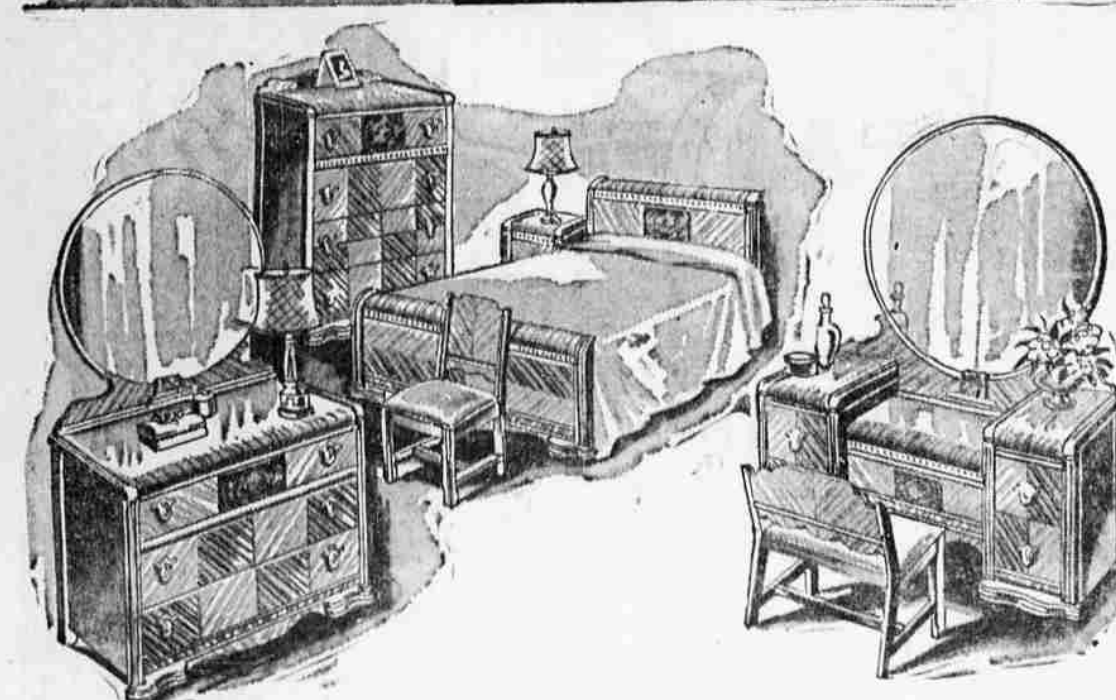
