Mustering Out Pay Still Open To Veterans

Mustering out pay is still available to World War II veterans discharged from service prior to Feb. 3, 1944, the Oregon Department of Veterans' Affairs reports. The state veterans' agency said there are numerous eligible veterans, or next of kin of deceased veterans, who have not applied to the Army or Navy for this benefit. The deadline is Feb. 3, 1950.

Survivors may apply in those cases where the veteran was separated from service before his death and prior to Feb. 3, 1944. Survivors are also entitled to unpaid installments in case of separation after Feb. 3, 1944. The benefit is not payable to survivors of those who died in service.

Mustering out benefits provide payment of \$100 for those with less than 60 days' active service; \$200 for those with more than 60 days' active duty in the United States only, and \$300 for those with more than 60 days' service including foreign duty. Veterans discharged after Feb. 3, 1944, are presumed to have received mustering out pay at time of discharge and in either one or two monthly installments thereafter.

The applicant must submit his original discharge papers along with his application. Army veterans who entered service from Oregon, Washington or Montana should apply to the U. S. Army Finance Office, 4735 E. Marginal Way, Seattle, Wash. Army veterans who entered from other states should write the Army Finance Center, Bldg. 204, St. Louis 20, Mo.
