LUTHERAN HOUR CHORUS CONCERT TO BE HEARD HERE ON JUNE 25TH

W. A. Sylwester, pastor of St. Paul's Lutheran Church of this city, and also of St. John's Lutheran Church of Sutherlin, announced today that the two congregations will jointly sponsor a sacred concert to be presented by the Lutheran Hour Chorus. The concert is to be given at the Roseburg Senior High School auditorium on Thursday, June 25, beginning at 8:15 p. m.

The Lutheran Hour Chorus consists of twenty-four theological students of the Concordia Lutheran Seminary at St. Louis, Missouri, and is under the direction of Harold Hiller. The men of the chorus are selected by competitive tryouts from more than four hundred students. This internationally famed chorus sings every Sunday on the Lutheran Hour on which Dr. Walter A. Maier is the speaker. At the present time the chorus is on an extended tour and will appear in over fifty concerts before the tour is completed. The chorus is traveling north from St. Louis to Minneapolis, Minnesota, and from there west to the Pacific Coast states, Washington, Oregon and California.

The Lutheran Hour Chorus and its director specialize altogether in sacred music, drawn from the heritage of the church throughout the centuries. The chorus is noted for its interpretation of Bach chorales, considered the finest type of church hymn. The concert program will have a goodly representation of Bach chorales, as well as choral works by Handel, Telesnokoff and Grieg. Among the more modern composers, Noble and Richter will highlight the program.

The public is most cordially invited to hear this chorus when it appears in Roseburg on June 25. No admission will be charged. However, a free-will offering will be taken at the concert to help defray the costs of the local appearance. Any profit made will be used to support the broadcasts of the Lutheran Hour.
