The next meeting will be held Thursday evening July 14 at the home of Mrs. Ruth Manning east of Sutherland.

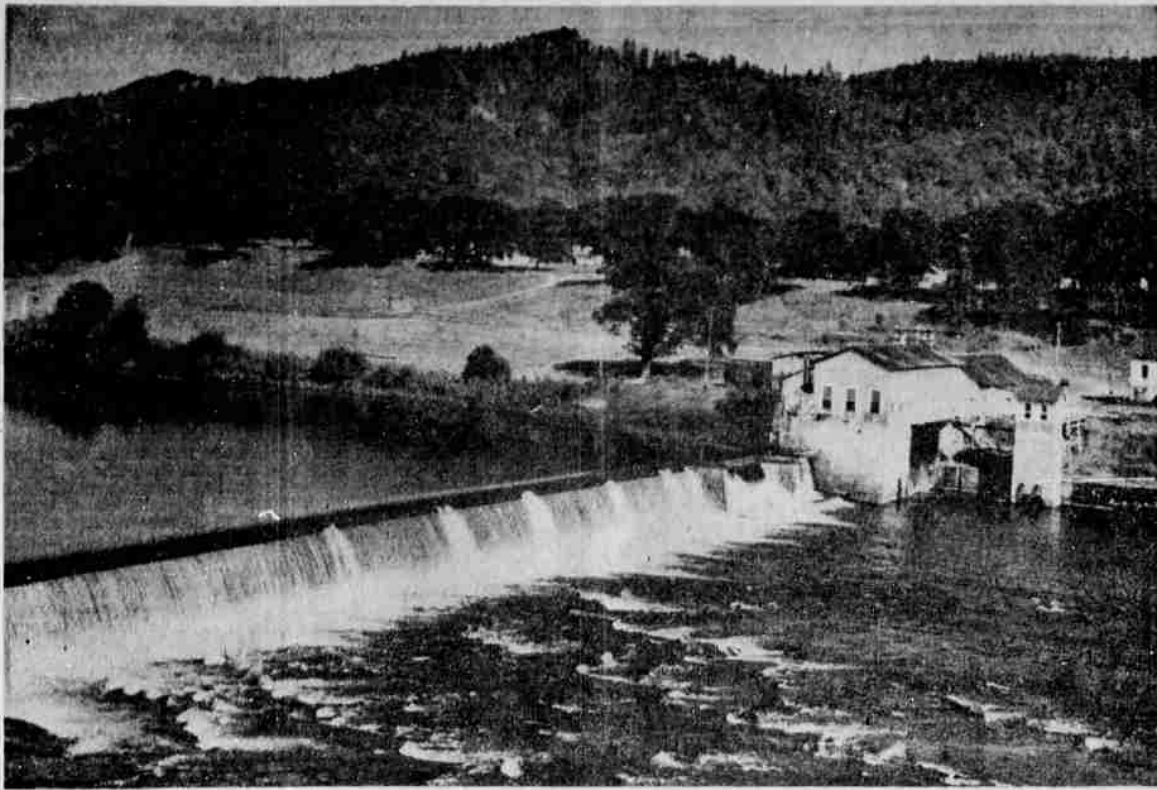
The penny prize was won by Mrs. Gillette.

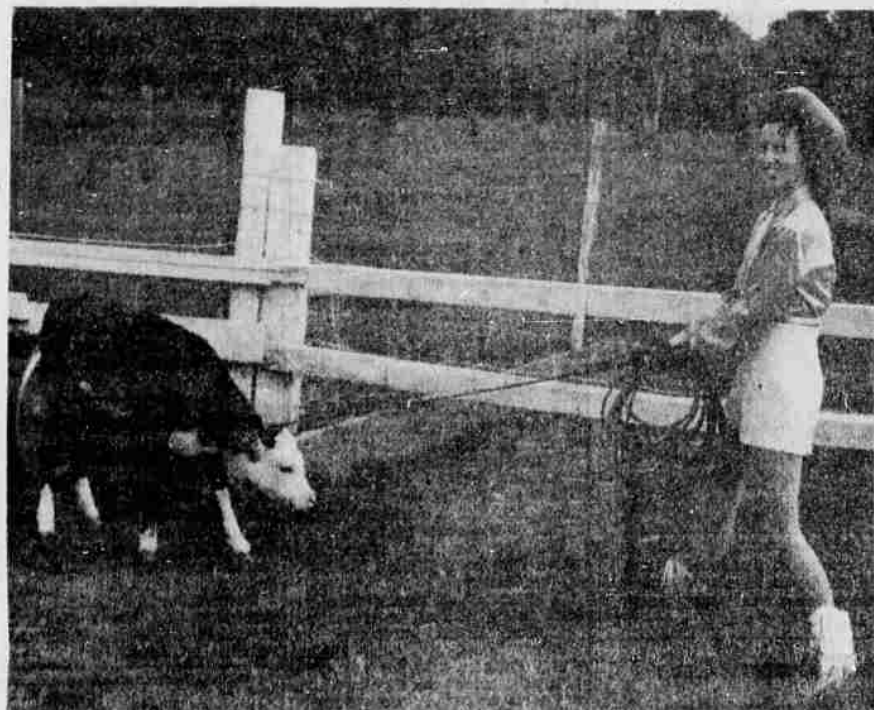
ZULEIMA CLUB TO MEET ON WEDNESDAY

Scramble By Sixty-One Boys And Girls For Calves, Lambs Will Feature Rodeo Program At County Fairgrounds

Twenty-six girls and 35 boys will take part in lamb and calf scrambles sponsored by the 4-H clubs at the Douglas County Sheriff's Posse Rodeo this week. The lambs will be loosed in the arena at the Friday afternoon show, as the last event of the day. The girls will each attempt to capture a lamb and lead it out of the arena.

Girls successful in catching the lambs will assume ownership and care of the animals and will agree to exhibit them at the Douglas County Fair, Aug. 25, 26 and 27, this year.

The calves will be turned into the arena at Saturday's show. The same rules will apply to the boys, except that each will be furnished a halter with which he must attempt to halter a calf.

The boys will raise their calves for showing at the 1950 Douglas County Sheriff's Posse Rodeo. After judging, the boys may then keep or sell their animals, as they wish.

Six U. S. Men Die As Result Boat Fire

TOKYO, June 13.—(AP)—Six U. S. airmen and Japanese died Friday when an 83-foot rescue boat caught off the East Coast of Japan. The Air Force reported Friday.

Cpl. Albert Duffield Jr., Willow Grove, Wis., was the only survivor. He told officers the boat was six mi. off Sandai, north of Tokyo, when it caught fire.

Duffield managed to swim the six miles to shore. An intensive search failed to locate other survivors. Four bodies have been recovered.

Names of victims are withheld.

Trucker Slays Woman, Son With Baseball Bat

PHILADELPHIA, June 13.—(AP)—A divorcee and her nine-year-old son were beaten to death with a baseball bat in their downtown Philadelphia apartment.

Shortly after the mother died Friday, Capt. James Kelly of the homicide squad announced police are holding a 29-year-old truck driver whom he said admitted the slayings.

Kelly said the truck driver, Robert Gemberling, told him in an oral statement that he killed the two for revenge.

The attack took place last night. Nine-year-old Michael Lubowski was dead when authorities entered the gas-filled apartment.

Woman, 89, Weds No. 7, 14 Years Her Junior

HARLAN, Ky., June 13.—(AP)—Seven times a bride, 89-year-old Mrs. Lucy Jane Johnson looked at spectators outside County Judge W. J. R. Howard's chambers where she was married Friday, and asked: "Why shouldn't I get married if I want to?"

Mrs. Johnson's newest husband, Isaac, is 75 and has been married three times. They both reside at Harlan, near the Bell-Harlan County line. He listed his occupation as a laborer.

Court records showed Mrs. Johnson's sixth husband, the late John Blevins, was 95 at the time of their marriage in Sept., 1945.

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
