Class members at work in upholstery instruction in Eugene being taught by Mrs. Mae H. Frye, who arrived here Monday to begin a 10-day class of instruction for the Roseburg School District in cooperation with the State Vocational Education Department.

Women of Roseburg and community are most cordially invited to take advantage of a very interesting class being sponsored at this time at the Junior High School every night this week through Friday and next week from Monday through Friday. The course of 10 lessons in upholstery, drapery making and slipcovers, is held nightly from 7 to 10 p.m. If the class enrollment reaches 18 members, the fee for the course will be \$4.

Mrs. Frye has the reputation as being one of the finest instructors in this course in the state. She teaches in Eugene nine months of the year and during the summer conducts classes for the State Vocational Education Department. A waiting list of 300 is on file for class instruction. The class instruction is considered one of the most beneficial and interesting open to women at this time.

Mrs. Frye stated it is a great source of satisfaction to a woman to be able to make beautiful and lasting articles of furniture from such articles as barrels, old furniture and left-overs. With the many beautiful new materials for covering furniture, women taking the class work have been able to turn out completed articles in a professional manner.

If there is a sufficient demand for morning and afternoon classes in this same course and an enrollment of 18 can be secured for each class, Mrs. Frye states she will be most happy to conduct the class instruction.
