Congress Group OKs Plan For Govt. Shakeup

WASHINGTON, June 16.—A House-Senate Committee agreed Wednesday on legislation giving the President broad powers to reorganize the government.

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The agreement broke a month-long deadlock. Senator McClellan (D-Ark.) said the compromise knocks out the special treatment the House had provided for the national military establishment and six other agencies.

He said it also provides that reorganization plans submitted by the President may be vetoed by a majority vote of the full membership of either branch of Congress.

The bill the House has passed provided that the President's plans would become effective unless disapproved by both the Senate and the House.

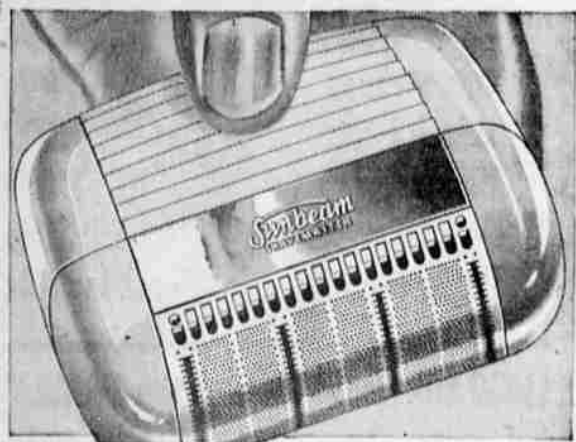
The Senate balked at that. It passed a bill that allowed either branch of Congress to kill a presidential reorganization plan by a simple majority vote.

In general, the legislation would let the President work out plans to shift around federal agencies with the idea of improving the government's organization. He would send a plan to Congress and, if it was not disapproved within 60 days, it would become effective.

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Officers Elected, Progress Related At Annual Meet Of T-B And Health Association

Miss Helen Falbe, Roseburg, was elected president of the Douglas County Tuberculosis and Health Association for the coming year at the annual meeting Wednesday noon in the Hotel Umpqua. She succeeds Mrs. H. A. Watzig.

Other officers elected include Don Forbes, Roseburg, vice-president; Mrs. O. L. Torrey, Sutherlin, first district vice-president; Mrs. Fritz Snyder, Days Creek, second district vice-president; Mrs. Harold Schmeier, Roseburg, secretary, and Mrs. Ray Petrequin, Roseburg, treasurer.

Named as directors for one year were Mrs. J. F. Dillard, Rev. W. A. MacArthur, Edward Murphy and Mrs. Edward Tauscher, all of Roseburg; for two-year term directors, Paul Elliott and John Dingley, both of Roseburg; Robert Kelly, Myrtle Creek, and Mrs. John Edwards, Oakland.

Mrs. Watzig, as retiring president, is automatically a member of the Board of Directors, and Mrs. J. A. Harding, Roseburg, was named an honorary member.

Prior to the election a change in the by-laws was adopted, setting up the Board of Directors and changing the officer listings.

The retiring officers include, besides Mrs. Watzig, Mrs. O. L. Torrey, Sutherlin, first vice-president; Mrs. John Edwards, second vice-president; Mrs. Fritz Snyder, Days Creek, third vice-president; Mrs. Hugh Whipple, Drain, fourth vice-president; Mrs. Wallace Ferguson, Roseburg, secretary, and Mrs. Ray Petrequin, Roseburg, treasurer. Several of these were named on the new officer staff.

Dr. J. E. Campbell, Roseburg, was named as representative director of the State Association. Mrs. William F. Amiot, Roseburg, is executive chairman.

A board of acting directors during the past year included Mrs. J. F. Dillard, Mrs. Edward Murphy and Rev. MacArthur. Paul Elliott was representative director.

The nominating committee included Mrs. Kenneth Adams, Mrs. W. H. Carter, Mrs. Horace Wells, Mrs. Paul Helweg, all of Roseburg, and Mrs. Ralph Moore, Days Creek.

The meeting was featured by a talk by L. P. Putman, field organizer and director of the staff of the Oregon Tuberculosis and Health Association. He spoke on the importance of organization and the progress made during the many years since 1904 when the fight against tuberculosis began.

In that year 150,000 persons died in the United States from tuberculosis, an average of 200 for each 100,000 persons, he stated. Last year 50,000 persons died from the disease, or only 33.5 per 100,000. In Oregon in 1948 the death rate was 75.2. In 1948 it was 17.3. Last year there were 216 deaths. The Oregon death rate is considerably lower than the national as a whole.

But in spite of this rapid progress, said the speaker, the fight against tuberculosis has only begun. He urged stronger community and professional cooperation in the fight, and stressed the importance of an educational program of prevention, case finding and treatment of the disease.

A brief motion picture depicting organization of the fight against tuberculosis was shown.

Mrs. Watzig, in her opening talk, stated: "The cooperation of many groups in various ways has made it possible to carry on an extensive enthusiastic program of Douglas County Tuberculosis and Health Association. We extend our most sincere thanks."

"Since our last annual meeting in May, 1948, at which Dr. C. C. Bellinger was our inspiring speaker, we have had nine constructive board meetings with an average attendance of 12 interested workers."

She called attention to progress shown and the growth of interest in health work in general.
