

Sen. Morse Scores Reported State Dept. Plan To Reduce Tariff On Cherry Imports

WASHINGTON, June 15.—(AP)—Senator Morse (R-Ore) asked the state department Tuesday if it intends to reduce the tariff on cherries from Italy and France.

"If there is any intention of negotiating for such an outrageous cut in the tariff," he said in a letter to the Department, "I want to know it now before this reciprocal trade treaty debate starts in the Senate."

Morse said that Eastern buyers are offering low prices for Oregon cherries, telling growers they anticipate a 50 per cent cut in the import duty and saying that such action will result in

flooding the U. S. market with Italian cherries.

Morse told the Department he had just returned from a week in Oregon, during which he conferred with Cherry growers.

Last year he said Eastern buyers, who provide the chief market for Oregon cherries, paid growers 12 cents a pound.

This year, he said, they are offering five cents a pound for Royal Ann cherries and 41 cents a pound for the black variety of Oregon cherries.

He said the growers say it costs them three cents a pound to pick cherries and one cent a pound to

haul them to market. This leaves them a profit of only one cent on the Royal Anns and 1 cent a pound on the black variety.

"This means," he said, "the Oregon cherry growers will suffer tremendous financial losses this year and a greater number will go bankrupt."

Morse said that if there is no likelihood of a tariff reduction the Department should make a statement to that effect so that Eastern buyers "can be prevented from using the State Department in this matter in their negotiations with the Oregon cherry growers."

Morse said it was very important that he have a quick reply "because Northwest cherry growers are entitled to protection from the type of tactics Eastern buyers are adopting through their assumption of State Department action."

Previously Rep. Holmes (R-Wash) and Rep. Horan (R-Wash) also protested against any cut in the duty on Italian cherries.

Anderson Forest Bill Rapped At Convention

CORVALLIS, Ore., June 15.—(AP)—A Senate bill was pictured to lumbermen here as threatening the ruin of private forestry operations.

Stuart Moler of the Western Forestry and Conservation Association told the Western Forest Industries convention that the Anderson bill would put all forest land in control of the Secretary of Agriculture.

Moler said the lands then would be administered by the forest service. States which would not conform to the federal rules in forestry would not receive federal funds.

Phone Girls Aid In Saving Town From Destruction

LYTTON, B. C., June 15.—(AP)—Three telephone operators who remained at their posts while flames crackled through this Central British Columbia city were credited today with helping to save the community from destruction.

No injuries were reported, but preliminary estimates set damage at about \$200,000.

The operators put through warning calls to the city's power station, some 10 miles distant, and crewmen were able to cut off electricity, avoiding the danger of further fires from short circuits.

Non-Communist Oaths Due For Investigation

WASHINGTON, June 15.—(AP)—Robert N. Denham, general counsel of the National Labor Relations Board, Monday turned over to the Justice Department for investigation the non-Communist affidavits made by three officers of the CIO-United Furniture Workers.

Denham said he took the action "because of the publicity" surrounding the affidavits made by Max Perlow, secretary-treasurer of the union.

When Perlow made the affidavit, he was quoted as saying he had resigned from the Communist party but was not forswearing its principles.

The affidavit, a sworn statement that the maker is not a Communist, must be filed by union officers if their unions are to make use of NLRB machinery.

The other officers are Morris Pizer, president, and Ernest Marsh, director of organization. Denham made no comment about the status of Pizer and Marsh, but he passed their affidavits along to the Justice Department with Perlow's.

The NLRB form provided for the affidavits carries a printed notice to union officers that false information is a violation of the criminal code punishable by a \$10,000 fine and ten years in jail.

Denham said in a statement concerning the furniture workers' case that neither he nor the NLRB has authority under the Taft-Hartley Act to police the anti-Red oaths.

No Major War While UN Meets, Lie Declares

NEW YORK, June 15.—(AP)—Trygve Lie, secretary-general of the United Nations, predicted Monday that "no war of importance will ever be started while the (U. N.) general assembly is in session."

"An aggressor just could not get away with it," he told the 40th annual Rotary International convention.

Lie made the observation while emphasizing the value of the assembly in giving smaller nations "a chance to act as checks and balances upon the power . . . and . . . the power conflicts of the great countries."

Lie frankly listed the UN's failures since it was formed four years ago this month. As for it being a peace enforcement agency, he said:

"The international policeman is walking around trying to keep nations from fighting each other, not only without a gun, but without even a club to help him."

He noted that the great majority of people around the world have not lost their faith in the UN "but they are worried," Lie explained.

"If they live in the western world, they worry about the 'veto' blocking the will of the majority. If they live in eastern Europe, they worry about 'mechanical majorities' riding 'roughshod' over the minority. If they live in Asia and Africa they worry about how much help—or how much hindrance—the United Nations will prove to be in their struggle toward freedom."
