

Monica Lind's Dancers Dated At Senior High

Monica Lind, famed ballerina, and her company of dancers are scheduled to appear at the Roseburg Senior High School auditorium Wednesday, June 22, at 8 p. m. This will be Miss Lind's second appearance in this city. She and her troupe were popularly acclaimed when they were here a year ago.

The program will consist of "Romanza," a traditional classic ballet, set to the music of Frederick Chopin with Joel Benway, Morla Branda and Vonda Benson in the leading roles.

"Concerto" is a modern abstract choreographed to the music of Aram Katchaturian's "Piano Concerto," with Monica Lind in the starring role, partnered by Joel Benway, and supported by Morla Branda, Gerylal Donald, Joy Allen and Vonda Benson.

"Slaughter on 10th Avenue" is a jazz ballet to the music of Richard Rodgers of the "Hammerstein and Rogers" team of Oklahoma fame. This ballet takes place in a saloon on New York's rough and tough 10th Avenue. The characters of the people are questionable and are performed with "Tongue in Cheek." There is gun play and comedy.

"La Lune Verte" (The Green Moon), is a storybook ballet, especially appreciated by children. The story takes place in a mythical kingdom in which the king offers the hand of his daughter in marriage to any man who will

travel to the moon and bring him a sample of the green cheese the moon is made of. The ballet is full of comedy and beauty. Miss Lind portrays the princess with great technical skill and emotional beauty. The part of the prince is portrayed by Joel Benway. The comedy is furnished by Morla Branda as the court dancer, and Lauren Allen as the court jester. Rosalie King, youthful protegee of Miss Lind, will dance the role of the court page.

Miss Joan Rutter, Roseburg's own ballerina, will appear as guest soloist in the mazurka from "Romanza." Miss Rutter is a pupil of Ulah Rhoden.

Judge Protects Landlord From Debt Imprisonment

PORTLAND, June 17.—(AP)—A federal judge yesterday refused to order a landlord to repay rent overcharges because he said, it might lead to imprisonment for debt.

Federal Judge McCulloch said that an action brought in the name of Tighe E. Woods, national housing expediter, charged John S. Brown, apartment house owner, with over-collecting rents by \$282 and asked restitution.

The judge said government counsel indicated it would enforce a restitution order by invoking the court's contempt powers. "Since I consider this to be imprisonment for debt, which is abolished, the order for restitution is denied," the judge said.


