High School Teachers Going Back To Grades

PORTLAND, June 17.—(AP)—Thirty qualified high school teachers are going to school to learn how to be elementary school teachers.

The program, worked out by George Eby, Portland's assistant superintendent for personnel, aims at filling part of the shortage of elementary school teachers.

They will take an eight-week course this summer, then get emergency certificates, qualifying them for their new positions. They will complete their special study in primary education either in night school or next summer.

Quakers Change College Name To End Confusion

NEWBERG, Ore., June 17.—(AP)—The Quakers are going to do the friendly thing in settling confusion over the names of Pacific College here and Pacific University at Forest Grove.

The yearly meeting of the Oregon Friends Church has approved changing the college name to George Fox College.

Fox founded the Friends Church in England three centuries ago.



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Big Western Timber Stands, Moose Increase Credited To Forest Fires Of Past Ages

VANCOUVER, B. C., June 17.

(AP)—The west owes the existence of some of its great timber stands to the fact that the areas once were swept by forest fires, says a United States Forest Service official.

This is especially true of the Douglas fir, western white pine and ponderosa pine of the mountains and Pacific Northwest, Russell K. Lebaron, chief of Forest Management Research at Missoula, Mont., told a meeting of the Ecological Society of America here.

"These timber stands would have been replaced by less valuable tree species long before the settlement of this continent if it had not been for periodic forest fires," Lebaron said.

Forestry leaders have come to realize that fires can be beneficial as well as destructive, and are experimenting now with controlled burning, he added.

Lebaron explained that fires many years ago destroyed brushy undergrowth which blocked the natural reseeding of the timber

lands. This growth develops under the big trees and prevents their seeds from gaining a foothold. When the parent trees died of old age there would have been no more pine or fir without the fires which cleared the way for the seedlings.

Fires four decades ago also contributed to an increase in the moose population, said James Hatter of the British Columbia Game Department at Victoria.

Moose feed on young willow and other short undergrowth in the forest areas. When this growth gets too tall the animals cannot reach it. Fire destroys it and brings about a regrowth of young, short plants.

Limited use of fire to retard sagebrush and promote grass growth on ranges was reported by Joseph F. Pechanec of the U. S. Forest Service at Portland, Ore.

Fire as a tool for fighting the white pine bark beetle was described by James C. Evenden of the U. S. bureau of entomology and plant quarantine at Coeur D'Alene, Idaho.

President Truman Given 4-H Club Leader's Pin

WASHINGTON, June 17.—(AP)—President Truman Thursday received a 4-H Club leadership pin in recognition of his work years ago in organizing a 4-H Club in Jackson County, Mo., his home.

Accepting the award in the presence of several hundred boys and girls attending the National 4-H Club Camp here, the President said he was vitally interested in what the youngsters are doing to better farm conditions.

The ceremony was held in the White House rose garden.

Four Club members posed with the president including Mary Bowers, Payne County, Okla., and Dan Warmock, Baker, Ore. The 4-H organization cited 11 civil leaders and six of its own state leaders for "outstanding service" to the 4-H club movement.

Leniency Shown Boy Who Set Two Schools Afire

PORTLAND, June 17.—(AP)—City fire investigator W. R. Curtis has decided a 14-year-old boy, held in setting afire two Dunaway school portable units, didn't intend to destroy them.

Curtis said he was "going to presume" the fire was accidentally set by the lad who had graduated from the grade school this spring. The inspector blamed the fire on "playing with matches."
