

Gordon Beats Kahut On 2-1 Decision

Local Puncher Amazes Fans By Triumph

Cowan Fractures Thumb In Losing To Gimmell; Kennedy Defeats Kaas

 Over 1,500 spectators saw Babe "Hardrock" Gordon—the lad rated by ringwise railbirds to last only two rounds at most against the formidable Joltin' Joe Kahut of Woodburn—come up with a surprisingly potent left hand that was used with amazing success in a 10-round main event at Finlay Field Friday night.

When the dust cleared, the arbiters decided in favor of Roseburg's underdog puncher by a two-to-one vote—Referee Red Green voting for Kahut.

Kahut undeniably carried the fight to Gordon for most of ten rounds. The Roseburg battler continued to step back as Joltin' Joe advanced in a semi-crouch. But it was Gordon, repeatedly landing with stiff left jabs to the body and head, that had the Woodburn lad looking for cover.

Manager Jack Capri's charge clearly had the advantage in the final two rounds, Kahut unleashed a series of rights and lefts that looked bad for Gordon and had the fans in a tizzy, but Gordon apparently had already done the major damage in earlier rounds.

Kahut didn't land what appeared to be a damaging punch until the fifth round; then one of his famous overhand rights collided with Gordon's head. Gordon later related this one really had him seeing the bright little headlights.

Kahut apparently grew stronger as the contest drew to a close. He repeatedly landed lefts and rights to Gordon's body and head, but with the exception of the jarring punch in the fifth, Gordon never appeared to be in serious trouble.

From start to finish, the Babe kept jabbing away, catching Kahut first in the stomach, then on the head. Kahut continually advanced on Gordon in a half-crouch. Gordon was backing up, but in doing so, he repeatedly ripped out with his mean-looking left hook.

Time after time, the fans, who expected to see the local boy massacred, roared with approval when Gordon caught his

highly-rated opponent in the face or body.

Kahut did not lack in support, however, and his overhand rights and chopping lefts brought favorable response from Kahut fans.

Clean sportsmanship was clearly evident during the course of the show. Once when Gordon slipped on the canvas, leaving himself wide open for a punch to the head, Kahut held up until his opponent had his guard up again.

The decision of the judges was met with enthusiastic response by a spectator crowd at the outset that wouldn't have given a plugged washer for Babe's chances, but who, at the termination of the fight, agreed he merited top-flight appraisal.

Kahut, who fought his 60th fight last night, showed the sportsmanship required of battlers. He kept his personal feelings of the fight's outcome under a friendly grin.

An equally torrid demonstration of ring action was the semi-final bout between Roseburg's Mickey Gimmell and Al "Pinky" Cowan of Spokane.

Cowan had the unfortunate luck of breaking his thumb for the third time while in a ring. He could not come out for the seventh round, and Gimmell was awarded a TKO.

The fair-skinned Spokane kid started out with a bang, repeatedly connecting with Gimmell's face and body. Gimmell put up a credible defense, but he couldn't get past Pinky's slambang style of boxing last night.

In the dressing room, Cowan related he felt the thumb give way in the fifth round, but he continued to punch away until extreme pain forced him to quit. A swollen joint clearly indicated the member was injured.

Phillies Blank Cards in Sixth Straight Win

Dodgers Defeat Cubs; Pirates Down Giants; Cleveland Tips Yanks

 It's about time somebody started paying attention to those "fightin' Phillies" from Philadelphia.

While they're at it, they could also give the double-O to the Phil's young bonus pitcher, 22-year-old Robin Roberts.

A chronic second division club since 1932, the Phils weren't given a tumble in pre-season play. Only the most optimistic favored them with a first division berth.

Now here it is the middle of June, and Eddie Sawyer's scrappy bunch are in the thick of the pennant fight—two games from the top. They've won 15 of their last 19 games.

The Phils achieved their most noteworthy feat of the year last night, cooling Harry Brechen and the St. Louis Cards, 8-0. Roberts gave a brilliant pitching performance.

The victory extended Philadelphia's winning streak to six straight games and moved them into a virtual tie with the Cards for second place.

The victory was Robert's eighth of the year to tie Brooklyn's Ralph Branca for the league leadership. He has lost only three. It was his second shutout and his sixth straight.

Dodgers Defeat Cubs
 The Dodgers snapped a two-game losing slump, winning a tough 2-1 decision over the Chicago Cubs. Don Newcombe out-pitched Warren Hacker with a six-hitter for his fourth victory against the Cubs.

Cincinnati dumped the Boston Braves into fourth place, knocking off Billy Southworth's crew, 7-2. Howie Fox, aided by Walker Cooper's first inning home run with two aboard, won his fourth game. Johnny Sain suffered his seventh defeat.

Shelling Clint Hartung from the hill with a four-run barrage in the first inning, the Pittsburgh Pirates went on to defeat the New York Giants, 6-4. Ernie Bonham spaced seven hits for his second victory.

Cleveland Defeats Yankees
 The upsurging Cleveland Indians whipped the New York Yankees, 10-4, to extend their winning streak to six games. The Tribe, definitely on the move, now is four games over the .500 mark and only five and a half games from the top.

The Boston Red Sox won both ends of a double-header from the Chicago White Sox, 4-3 and 10-8. Boston pounded out 15 hits in the nightcap. Vern Stephens smashed his fifth home run, and Ted Williams hit his 15th.

The Philadelphia Athletics moved to within half a game of the second place Detroit Tigers, defeating the St. Louis Browns, 6-5.

Trojans At Top In Qualifying For Track Finals

LOS ANGELES, June 18.—(P)—Southern California, which won nine straight NCAA track and field championships before 1944, but has been shut out for five years, looks like the business again this season.

The pounding Trojans, paced by dash ace Mel Patton, qualified 12 men yesterday for today's finals in Memorial Coliseum. Stanford has seven, UCLA five, Michigan State four.

Mostly, the boys weren't giving their all in the running preliminaries, saving strength for today's payoff events. But Patton's time of 20.6 in a 220-yard dash heat was listed as the fastest in NCAA qualifying history. He was well behind his world record of 9.3 seconds, winning his century heat in 9.5.

If Pell-Mel wins his third straight NCAA 100-yard dash today he will equal the feat of Ralph Metcalfe of Marquette in 1932-33-34.

Moon Mondschein of NYU also goes after his third straight high jumping title. Two others have done this, Dave Albritton of Ohio State in 1936-38 and Ken Weisner, Marquette, 1944-46.

Washington State and Oregon each qualified one man.

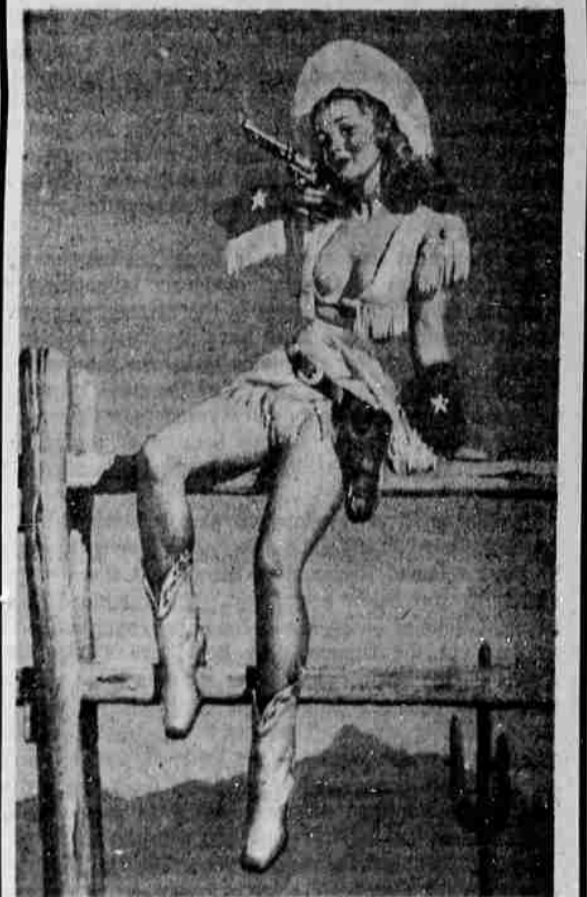
