LUTHERAN HOUR CHORUS TO BE HEARD IN CONCERT, JUNE 23

The Concordia Seminary Lutheran Hour Chorus of Saint Louis, Missouri, will present a concert of sacred music in this city on Thursday, June 23 at the Roseburg Senior High School. Appearing under the auspices of St. Paul's and St. John's Lutheran Churches the Chorus comprises 23 theological students of Concordia Seminary under the direction of Harold Hiller. The men of the Chorus are selected by competitive tryouts from more than 400 students. This internationally famed Chorus sings every Sunday on the Lutheran Hour, Dr. Walter A. Maier, speaker. Bringing Christ to the Nations is the largest religious broadcast in the world, and heard every Sunday morning by more than 15,000,000 listeners.

Last year this Chorus toured the major cities of the Great Lakes region and the east coast from Canada to South Carolina. Music critics were unanimous in their praise of this famed Chorus' tone, enunciation, and interpretation.

This year the Concordia Seminary Lutheran Hour Chorus is appearing in 50 sacred concerts, the majority of which will be presented on the West Coast. The Chorus travels from St. Louis north to Minneapolis and from there west to Spokane, Wash. The Chorus then appears in concert throughout Washington, Oregon, and California, and from Los Angeles will return to the starting point in St. Louis.

The Lutheran Hour Chorus and its director, specialize altogether in sacred music, drawn from the heritage of the Church throughout the centuries. The Chorus is noted for its interpretation of Bach Chorales, considered the finest type of church hymn. The concert program will have a goodly representation of Bach Chorales as well as chorals works by Handel, Tchesnokoff and Grieg. Among the more modern composers, Noble and Richter will highlight program. A free-will offering will be taken.
