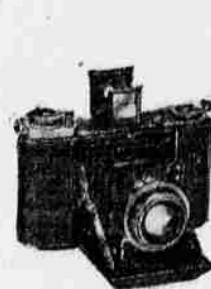
Luncheon was served at noon to Mrs. E. A. Pearson, president, and the hostess, Mrs. Hess.
