Morse also assailed the Taft proposal, which includes—among other things—explicit authority for 60-day injunctions, similar to the injunctions now obtainable under the Taft-Hartley act.

Morse's plan would permit seizure, but only after a ten-day period during which Congress, if it wished, could veto the idea. And it would specifically prohibit the government from getting an injunction after seizure, unless Congress made an exception in a particular case.

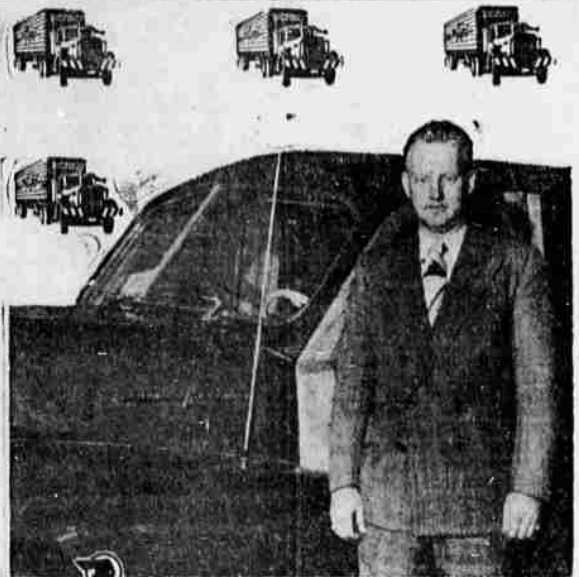

Conference Of Big 4 Ends In Peace Pledge

Austrian Independence Agreed On; Blockade Of Berlin To Remain Off

PARIS, June 21.—(AP)—The Big Four foreign ministers ended four weeks debate last night with a pledge for East-West peace and general agreement on an Austrian independence treaty.

As the conference closed, the following results were announced: A six-point statement of principles to guide negotiations in Germany. This featured a Russian promise not to reimpose a blockade of Berlin, in return for efforts to revive east-west trade in the former reich.

A joint communique announcing a series of agreements on the outstanding issues in the Austrian treaty and instructing the delegates to wrap up the document by Sept. 1.

Agreement among the four ministers to maintain contact and hold another meeting in New York next fall during the United Nations general assembly.

An American deputy, Samuel Reber, told newsmen he was confident the four powers would agree on an Austrian text in time for the fall session, when it presumably would be adopted and the allies would pull their forces out of Austria.

The conference had a hectic ending when Russia sought unsuccessfully to make a last-minute change in the Big Four's communique.

It seemed Vishinsky had been reprimanded by Moscow for one point on the Austrian treaty regarding oil profits.

After a hurried session at the French foreign office, it was decided to take up the point through diplomatic channels and the ministers left.

BELGRADE, Yugoslavia, June 21.—(AP)—With "deepest bitterness" Yugoslavia today denounced the decision of the Big Four for foreign ministers rejecting her claim for Austrian territory and reparations.

A formal statement was issued by the foreign affairs ministry of premier Marshal Tito, in which he denounced the results of the Big Four meeting adjourned yesterday in Paris.

foot. Three-inch asphalt paving would cost a total of \$14,520 or \$8.55 per running foot.

The problem involved primarily is what responsibility does the city have in maintaining graveled streets. If only the curbs and gutters are installed at property owner expense, the city would be required to give the street constant maintenance. While some maintenance and further oiling would be necessary if one coating of oil were applied at property owner expense, the city would be relieved to some extent. Paving would virtually eliminate city maintenance, but would bring the initial cost to the property owners to the much higher figure.

The matter was deferred until the property owners could be consulted, and a final decision made at the next meeting.

Ford St. Project Asked

Petition asking improvement of Ford St. between W. Lane and W. Mosher Sts. was referred to the Street Committee, with recommendation that the committee investigate the matter in time to make a recommendation to the planning commission before its meeting Monday of next week.

The council held the third and final reading on the ordinance to change the classification of the block bounded by Main, Kane, Cass and Lane Sts. from Class 2 residential to business. This is the block in which the American Legion plans erection of a new building.

Mayor Flegel renewed the request of Flegel Transfer & Storage and Roseburg Lumber Company for paving of East Third St. from E. 2nd Ave. South to E. 1st Ave. South at the owner's expense. The matter had previously been deferred until the grade on E. 2nd Ave. South had been established.

Beaver Trapping Ban Is Sustained

SALEM, June 21.—(AP)—The State Game Commission's program of trapping destructive beaver and selling their pelts was upheld yesterday by the State Supreme Court.

Ed Fields and six other Union County residents sued the Commission in an effort to have the trapping program declared illegal.

Circuit Judge R. J. Green of Union county ruled the program is legal, and Tuesday's decision by Chief Justice Hall S. Lusk agreed with him.

Other court action: Disbarred Wesley B. Yates, Portland attorney, on five charges of unprofessional conduct brought by the board of governors of the Oregon State Bar. These charges included use of clients' money for his own use.

Ruled in a Clackamas County case that S. Raven, a logging truck contract carrier, has to pay \$8,000 damages for a fatal auto accident, and that the two com-

panies for which he hauled logs are not to blame. These companies are Crown Timber Company, Hubert J. Persons was killed when his car collided with a logging truck, which failed to stop. Circuit Judge Earl C. Laoutette held that the damages should be assessed against Raven and the two companies, but today's decision by Justice Arthur D. Hay ruled that Raven was solely responsible.

Upheld a Lane county decision giving \$5,000 damages to H. F. Severy in his suit against Arthur Myrmo. Cars driven by the two men collided at Florence. The decision by Justice Hay upheld Circuit Judge G. F. Skipworth of Lane County.

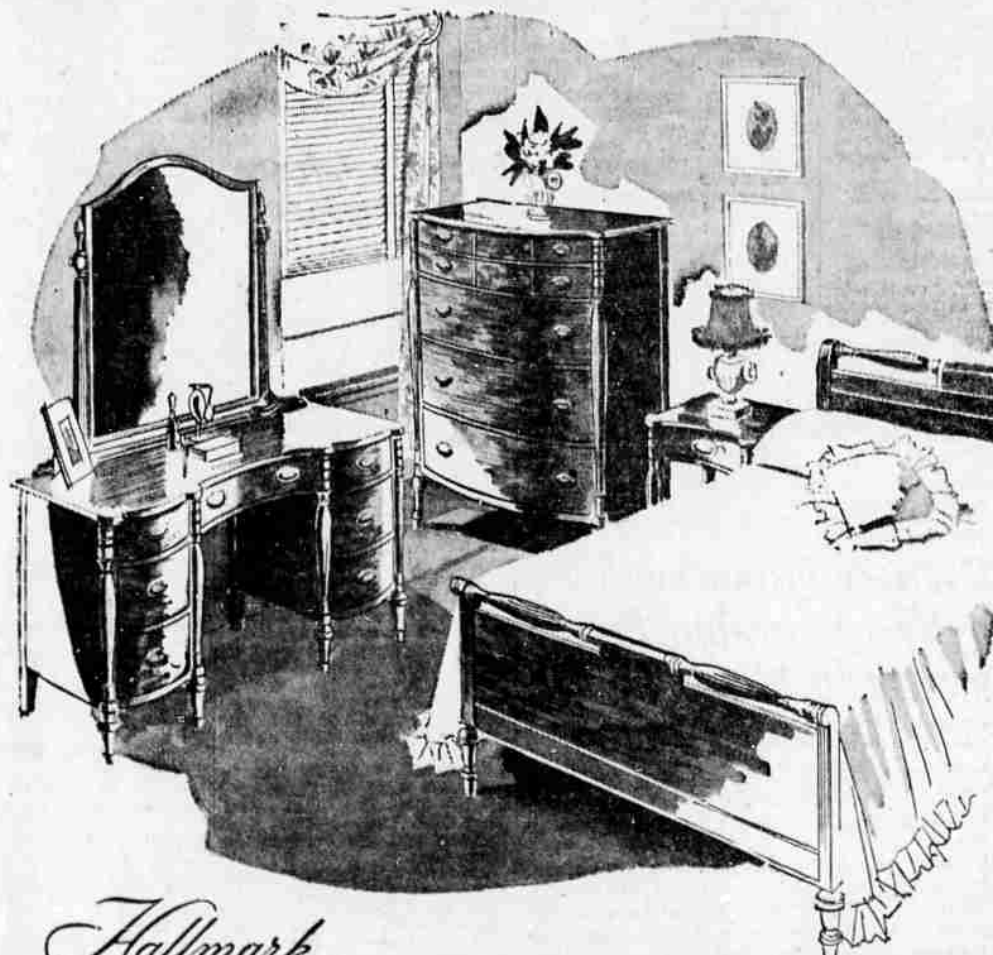
