Bill Admits Aliens Who Aided U. S. Intelligence

WASHINGTON, June 21.—(A)

President Truman Monday
signed a bill setting up statutory
operating authority for the supersecret central intelligence agency.
The measure writes into law
procedures the agency has been
using, including hiring and budget
practices not heretofore allowed
by law.
The bill allows the agency to
bring into this country every year

the bit allows the agency to bring into this country every year up to 100 aliens who have helped U. S. intelligence operatives abroad. The aliens will be cleared for entry by the CIA's director, the attorney general, and the discountry in the country of the country and will be rector of immigration, and will be eligible for U. S. citizenship.
