Injunction, Cash Asked In Batch Of New Suits Filed

Suit in Circuit Court has been brought by Roy Kinney and Emma Kinney against Besie Lester, asking that the defendant be enjoined from moving a "wooden shanty" from its present location to within five feet of a commercial garage owned by the plaintiffs in Myrtle Creek.

Earl Emmers demands judgment of \$700 in a suit filed against Jess Krusmark. He claims this is the share the defendant was sup-

posed to have contributed toward equipment in a partnership logging project.

Arthur Lee Allen, in a suit brought against Pat Boss, doing business as Patco Lumber Co., asks for a labor lien against 40,000 board feet of logs, which he alleges he felled and bucked for the defendant between Sept. 1, 1948, and Dec. 22, 1948. He claims he has coming \$279.

Judgment for \$913.98 is asked by C. M. McDermott for goods, allegedly sold to Lucille A. Nugent, doing business as S. Kay Garage.

Frank Grensky has filed suit to collect from O. L. Smith and Marilyn Smith \$268.75 allegedly due for rent.

O. & C. Timber Sales At Oral Auction Slated

Daniel L. Goldy, regional administrator, Region I, Bureau of Land Management, reported today that fourteen parcels of O. & C. timber carrying a volume of 8,651,000 board feet of timber with an appraised value of \$48,325.90 will be offered for sale during three days beginning July 12, 1949. Previously advertised to be sold at this time were twelve parcels of O. & C. timber carrying a volume of 48,908,000 board feet of timber with an appraised value of \$417,565.50.

Eleven of the parcels will be offered for sale by sealed bids on July 12, 1949 at the regional administrator's office in Portland. These tracts carry a volume of 6,606,000 board feet valued at \$32,743.40.

The three remaining parcels will be offered for sale at oral auction on July 12th and 14th at Roseburg and Eugene, respectively.

The two parcels to be offered July 12th carry a volume of 1,805,000 board feet appraised at \$11,994.50. Oral bidding will take place in the office of the Bureau of Land Management, Post Office Building in Roseburg.

On July 14th one parcel will be offered for sale at the office of the Bureau of Land Management in the Post Office Building in Eugene. This parcel carries a volume of 240,000 board feet with an appraised price of \$3,588.00.

Grade A Rating Given Milk In Portland

PORTLAND, June 23.—(AP)—Portland's milk won a grade A rating in the first complete post-war test by the U. S. Public Health Service.

Dr. Thomas L. Meador, city health officer, announced the result of the test. He said pasteurized milk, which constitutes 99.2 per cent of the milk sold here, was rated at 93.8 per cent. Raw milk was rated at 90.9 per cent.

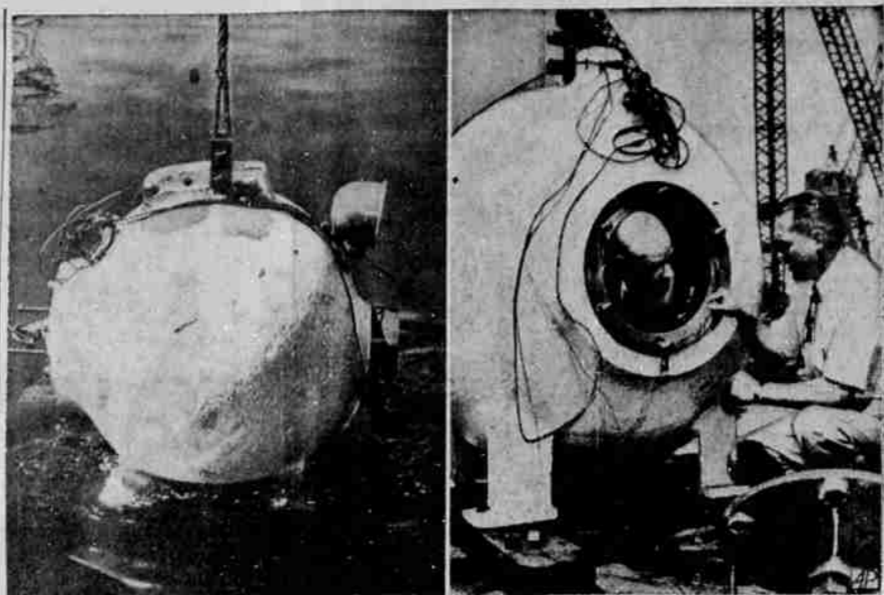
