80 Vacation Radio Shows To Go On Air

NEW YORK, June 27.—(AP)—When radio's summer season gets going full tilt, 80 vacation shows will be on display via the four networks. Most program absences prevail in July and August.

Because more sponsors than usual are taking what radio men label a "hiatus," this year's replacement crop has shown a pronounced increase. An important share of them are musical and dramatic productions.

By far the greatest number are being supplied by the networks, with less than a fifth by sponsors. Statistically, the figures are 67 by the networks and 13 by sponsors. As usual, a number of commercial shows go through the summer, but these are at a minimum.

A recapitulation has CBS providing 21 programs, NBC 17, ABC 15 and MBS 14. NBC sponsors are putting on ten replacements, CBS two and ABC one.

Motion Filed Asking Sentence Be Vacated

BOULDER, Colo., June 27.—(AP)—A motion to vacate the sentence given Joe Sam Walker, convicted of second degree murder in the slaying of University of Colorado Coed Theresa Foster, was filed in District Court here Saturday by Defense Attorneys Paul A. Ruston and James T. Burke.

Clerk of Court Charles Snively received the motion in the mail this morning and immediately notified Judge George H. Bradford in Greeley who has not yet set a date for hearing the motion.

Walker was sentenced last Monday to serve a term of not less than 80 years or more than life in the state penitentiary after his motion for a new trial was denied.

In the motion filed today, Burke and Ruston asked that the judgment and sentence be set aside and that "a more temperate and reasonable judgment and sentence be imposed."
