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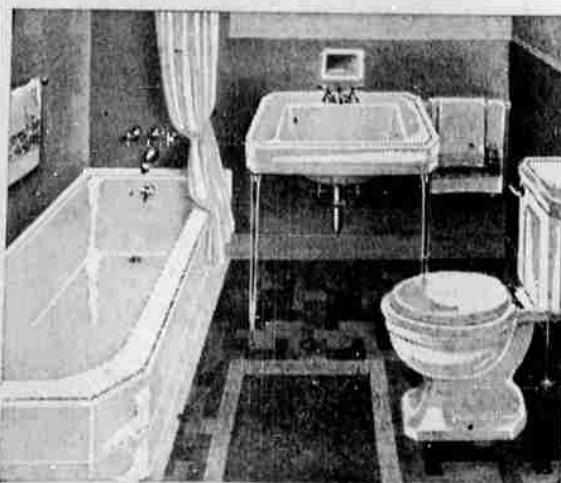

Hanna's "better mousetrap" features a trigger attachment for setting the neck-breaking snapper. It's guaranteed to help the owner catch more mice than fingers.

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Britain Calls Financial Experts In Money Crisis

LONDON, June 29. — (P) — Britain has called the Commonwealth's highest financial and economic planners to emergency talks on its deepening economic crisis.

Invitations were sent last week to Australia, Canada, Ceylon, India, New Zealand, Pakistan and South Africa. Only South Africa has so far accepted.

Purpose of the meeting would be to talk over ways and means of cutting down the drain on Britain's gold and dollar reserves.

These have dropped from \$2,208,000,000 to \$1,884,000,000 in the past year despite Marshall plan aid and an all-out export drive.

The treasury, in the past, has been reported as considering \$2,000,000,000 the "danger point" below which these reserves could not be allowed to go without threatening the stability of the pound and the country's position as banker to the sterling area.
