### Soap Operas, Democracies, Cats Are Topics At Toastmistresses' Meet

Installation of officers by retiring president Mrs. Dallen Jones highlighted Tuesday night's meeting of Toastmistresses at Carl's Haven.

Installed were Mrs. Herman Matloff, president; Mrs. Opal Tuttle, vice president; Mrs. Daniel Dimick, secretary; and Miss Barbara Weisz, treasurer.

Radios and soap operas were topics of toastmistresses in one-minute speeches, a regular feature of the self-betterment group's semi-monthly meetings.

A majority of members present opined soap operas are generally a "waste of time." Toastmistresses who indicated approval of soap operas qualified their partisanship by saying many are "too dramatic."

"Great confusion and chaos," are the lot of organizations permitting radios to be played in business offices, according to a majority opinion voiced by Speakers.

Main speakers of the evening, Miss Billie Ward and Mrs. Matloff, titled their topics "My Friends or My People" and "The Cat," respectively.

Miss Ward indicated people govern themselves in a democracy, but she sees a danger in voters balloting for a potential dictator. The head of the country may see the people as "my friends" but the wrong kind of public opinion may eventually permit him to call the citizens "my people," according to Miss Ward.

Cats were highly regarded in ancient Egypt, according to Mrs. Matloff, and a person might be executed for killing this "sacred" animal. She reported cats were mummified upon death.

Ignorance and superstition caused the cat to be regarded as a creature of evil force in the 18th century and persons sympathetic toward cats were usually burned at the stake for "practicing witchcraft."

Cats are poised, self-sufficient and graceful, according to Mrs. Matloff.

Mrs. Matloff was grammarian, Mrs. Tuttle was critic and Mrs. Philip Harth evaluator of the speeches.

### U. S. Won't Recognize Chinese Ports' Closing

WASHINGTON, June 29. (AP)—The United States today refused to recognize as legal a Chinese government order closing ports in Chinese Communist hands.

The State Department announced a note to the government at Canton declaring that this country "cannot admit the legality of barriers against shipping into the Communist ports unless the Chinese government declares and maintains an effective blockade."

The American action leaves the way open legally, at least, for American shippers to engage in commerce with Communist China. The British, to whom such trade is considerably more important, have been very anxious to keep trade channels open.

### Capt. Luoma Ready to Ship For Trolling Season

Captain Herman Luoma, of the outside trolling boat Rex is getting his boat ready for the summer trolling season, having recently returned to Reedsport after spending several weeks in Portland as a patient in the Veterans Hospital. He has not yet fully recovered from a serious operation undergone while there, but hopes to be ready to go on outside fishing by the time the summer run appears off this section of the Coast.

### U. S. Treasury Bond Prices Go To Higher Level

NEW YORK, June 30. (AP)—U. S. Treasury bond prices staged their sharpest rise in years yesterday as the government in effect moved to make them harder to get.

Bid prices of long-term government issues made advances ranging up to an extreme of about 50 cents per \$100 bond for the 2 1/2s of September, 1972-67, which were quoted at one time at \$104.50 bid. Normal daily fluctuation for the long-term obligations over most of this year has been about three to six cents per bond.

Government bond houses here said demand was substantial, but could not be satisfied since offerings were few. Some dealers said many would-be institutional buyers, such as banks and insurance companies, bid for large blocks of bonds yesterday in the belief the price rise would continue.

The upward movement followed directly a statement by the Federal Open Market Committee, which said in part:

"The Federal Open Market Committee, after consulting with the Treasury, announced that with a view to increasing the supply of funds available in the market to meet the needs of commerce, business and agriculture it will be the policy of the Committee to direct purchases, sales and exchanges of government securities by the Federal Reserve Banks with primary regard to the general business and credit situation."

This guarded statement was interpreted as meaning that in order to induce banks to lend money more freely to businesses, the Federal Reserve System would be less free in selling from its portfolio of government securities.

This would curtail the available supply of government securities, thereby forcing prices up and lowering the interest yield.

### Yoncalla Elects School Directors

tation was passed by a large majority.

At the grade school election Monday, June 20, Wilmott Dodd was elected director for a three-year term, winning over his opponent, Harry Abbott, by a majority of 16 votes. Dodd will succeed Sumner Brown, who declined to seek reelection.

The proposed levy of \$10,520 in excess of the constitutional tax limitation passed by a vote of 36

to 21. An extra levy of \$1,000 for the hot lunch program also carried, 32 to 24.

Madeline Cool was given 54 votes toward her election on the County Rural School Board.

### Three Crewmen Injured When Train Is Derailed

ATLANTA, June 29. (AP)—Three passenger coaches and two

other cars of the Kansas City-Florida special Southern Railroad train derailed near Eastman, Ga., today. Three crewmen were injured.

The chief dispatcher's office here said reports indicated none of the passengers apparently was hurt seriously.

Southern headquarters said the derailment may have been caused by a broken rail.

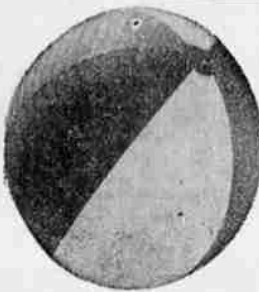
