Needed Contributions Slow In Coming To G. O. P. Chest; Leaders Try To Mend Breach

WASHINGTON, June 30.—(AP)—Republicans were reported feeling a financial pinch today as leaders tried to heal the breach opened by Vice Chairman Thomas E. Coleman's resignation from the Party's strategy committee.

In a closed meeting Tuesday, the strategy group tried to accept "with regret" Coleman's resignation as vice chairman, while retaining him as a member.

But the Party's Wisconsin state finance chairman would have none of it, saying he had quit the Committee entirely.

Members named a four-man group, composed of Whitney Gilliland of Iowa, Senator Owen Brewster of Maine, Rep. Leonard Hall of New York and Arthur E. Summerfield of Michigan to pick a successor as executive vice chairman.

The new official would run the strategy committee, with Rep. Hugh D. Scott Jr. staying on as its ex-officio head. Scott, the party's national chairman, told members he has been working 16 hours a day and needs help.

Coleman said in quitting that Scott hadn't been pushing the committee's work along fast enough.

Despite Coleman's stand, Scott got a pat on the back from members of the strategy group.

Beaten in last year's campaign, the Republicans have found the going rough in trying to get contributions.

They have been operating since November on about \$500,000 left over from the last presidential campaign, with reports to the clerk of the House indicating they have taken in only about \$72,000 in new money this year.

Party expenses run nearly that much in a single month, members estimated.

Scott reported to the executive group that things are looking up somewhat.

He said that seven states and two territories had turned in 10

Damages Demanded For Traffic Crash Injuries

H. A. Schornstein has filed suit in Circuit Court to collect \$3,000 general and other damages as the result of an automobile accident Oct. 28, 1948. Named as defendant is Robert T. Jones.

Schornstein states that his panel truck collided with the defendant's logging truck five miles north of Myrtle Creek on the North Myrtle Road. He charges negligence on the part of Jones, and claims injuries, to his chest, spinal column, left leg, and bruises, abrasions, rib fracture and shock to his nervous system.

He asks for special damages \$350 for medical and hospital care and \$500 for loss of work. He also asks \$99 damages to his car, \$50 for towing and storage, and \$500 for loss of use of the car.
