Plans were outlined for a box social to be held at Howard's Hardware store in Winston the evening of July 9.

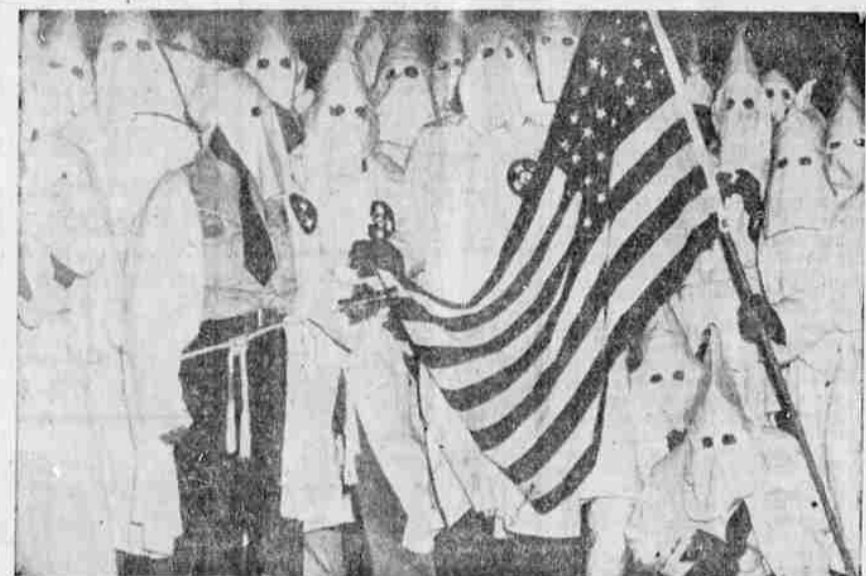
