SHANGHAL July 1 -(29)- An overcast and rain today kept Na-tionalist bombers from returning to Shanghai where Wednesday they killed 82 persons and injur-ed more than 100.

ed more than 100. Four-engined bombers, never more than two at a time, ranged leisurely over the city at low al-titude yesteriday seeking targets. Most of their bombs fell in the crowded native section of Chapei. It was the most daring raid yet on the Red-captured city. Almost negligible resistance was put up by the Communists. No anti-aircraft guns went into ac-tion. The bombers dropped down to around 1,500 feet to get below the overcast. They were just out of machinegun range—the only weapons used against them.


