

The War Assets Administration went out of business after handling disposal of surplus war property with an original price lag of \$27,000,000,000 during its often heetle four-year existence.

Final agency records showed a return to the treasury of about \$4,250,000,000 from WAA tran-sactions. That's about 22 cents re-ceived for every dollar spent on the mountains of combat-essential commodities and properties which ranged from multi-million dollar war plants to canned beef.

The thousands of war leftovers in which the agency did a land office business through regional salesrooms from coast-to-coast are now largely in private hands.
