## **Phone Workers Brand Unwanted Pay** Hike As Scheme For Rates Boost

SEATTLE, July 5. — (P) — ployes, not represented by the Eight thousand telephone workers in Washington and Northern Idaho got pay raises previously

Idaho got pay raises previously rejected by their union. The Pacific Telephone & Telegraph Company said the increases were granted following termina-tion June 30, of a contract with the CIO-Communications Workers of America, after the required 60-day notice.

E. J. Follis, president of the Washington-Idaho plant local of the union, expressed belief the company's action was an unfair labor practice. He said the union rejected the offer in March because it was discriminatory between cities.

The increases, applying to non-

tween cities.

The increases, applying to nonsupervisory employes, will total
\$1,200,000 a year.

Follis also said the company,
in granting the increases, "Is using its employes as guinea pigs in
an effort to get a rate increase."

The Washington State Public
Service Commission denied the
company an interim rate increase
last week because, among other
factors, it had not reached an
agreement with the union and
was not paying the increased was not paying the increased

wages.

The increases will range from \$2 to \$6 a week in Seattle and other "A" cities and from \$1 to \$5 elsewhere, a company spokesman said. For accounting emman said.
