

Aberdeen Hotel Fire Kills Seven

ABERDEEN, Wash., July 6.—An elderly woman hurried back into the blazing Lafayette Hotel early Sunday to recover her purse and her life-time savings of approximately \$3,000.

She was trapped by the roaring, fast-spreading flames and she and six others all perished. She was Mrs. Eliza Beshers. Police and coroner's deputies found the roll of scorched currency in her purse yesterday.

The injured persons, including Pfc. Jerry F. Ramey, 18, Olympia, were recovering. The burned-out hollow shell of the two-story building in which 32 persons lived was boarded up. Those who escaped got out on ladders or jumped to an adjoining roof.

No definite cause of the fire had been determined.

The dead: Mrs. Beshers; Mrs. Mary Kearns, 74; Mrs. Mary Abshire; Hugh Rogers, a paralytic; Paul Myhr, hotel proprietor; and Mr. and Mrs. Earl Christofferson, South Bend.

Ship Captain of Rescue Fame Dies

YONKERS, N. Y., July 6.—(AP)—Capt. George Fried, 71, master of some of America's biggest ocean liners, died yesterday.

Captain of the old Leviathan, America, George Washington and President Roosevelt, Fried was a central figure in many thrilling sea rescues.

While he captained the old America, the ship rescued 32 men from the Italian freighter Florida in a gale off Virginia.

In command of the President Roosevelt in 1926, he went to the aid of the stricken British freighter Antiope in a North Atlantic gale, and lost two of his crew rescuing the freighter's company.

In 1932, two years before he retired, Fried took the Roosevelt to the rescue of Lou Reichers, forced down in the sea by a cracked wing when he tried to fly the Atlantic.

Hawaiian Strike Hits 2 More Industries

HONOLULU, July 6.—(AP)—Hawaii's waterfront strike headaches spread to the pineapple packers and fish canners today.

Another month or so and they will be out of tinplate, they said.

Shipments of tinplate have been tied up in port since May 1 when the islands' 2,000 stevedores of the CIO International Longshoremen's and Warehousemen's Union struck. They demanded their wage of \$1.40 an hour be increased by 32 cents.

The American Can Co. told pineapple plantations there would be no more tinplate deliveries after the first week in August. That is about the time the \$70,000,000 pineapple crop hits its harvest peak.

Tuna packers said they had tinplate for another four weeks. Shutdowns would throw about 7,000 pineapple and 1,000 tuna workers out of work.

There were no holiday developments in negotiations to end the strike.

Pickers are to receive 10 cents a sack in fields yielding over 200 sacks and 12 cents a sack in fields yielding less.
