

Opening Of Douglas County's White-Tail Deer Refuge Plan Of State Game Commission

Douglas County's white-tail deer refuge will be opened to hunting this year if regulations proposed by the State Game Commission are adopted. The Commission will meet July 23 to hear any complaints about its tentative rules.

A petition to open the white-tail season in Douglas County was filed with the Commission by residents of the reserve, which lies between the North Umpqua river and the North Umpqua river from Winchester to Oak creek. The area has been closed for many years to protect one of the few remaining herds of white-tail deer in Oregon.

Residents of the reserve, however, have been protesting damage to crops and claim also that the herd is increasing to the point where it is infringing upon agricultural use of the land. No remonstrance to the plan for opening the reserve so far has been filed with the Commission.

Proposed hunting regulations for the coming deer season would provide opening October 1st and closing October 20th. The bag limit would be one male deer having not less than forked antlers.

Seasons on Birds
Open season on ring-neck pheasants would be from Oct. 21 through Oct. 26; bag limit two cock pheasants per day and not more than six during the entire season.

Other Upland Birds:
Valley quail, Oct. 21-30; bag limit five per day and not more than 15 during the entire season.

Blue and ruffed grouse, Sept. 1-5; bag limit two of either species during season.

The silver grey squirrel season would run from Oct. 1 to 20 in Douglas County with a limit of five in possession.

The Commission plans a limited season on antelope in Lane, Harney, and Malheur counties, east of highway 395 and south of highway 20, from August 20 to 25. Only 1,000 permits will be issued. Bag limit will be one adult buck having horns longer than the ears.

The western Oregon elk season is proposed for Oct. 25 to Nov. 3.

Inclusive; bag limit one bull elk having antlers with three points or more, including the brow tine. The eastern Oregon season would run from Oct. 25 to Nov. 20 with one animal of either sex being permitted in certain areas, particularly those where agricultural damage is most critical, but bull elk only in other sections of the state are scheduled for opening.

Dock Strike Perils British Economy, Cripps Says

LONDON, July 14. — (P) — Prime Minister Attlee told the House of Commons yesterday London's spreading wildcat dock strike threatens the economy of Britain at "a critical period in its history."

Attlee spoke as 14,000 idle dockers of a total force of 25,000 dug in for a showdown with the government. The strike, tying up 132 ships and causing eight others to be underrun, seriously hampered Britain's export-import program at a time when the nation is hard pressed by a growing dollar crisis.

The unofficial committee running the strike—declared by the labor government to be illegal and communist-led—announced plans for a monster mass meeting Sunday in Trafalgar Square in support of the workers.

Troops sent into the dock area under the proclamation of a national emergency began erecting field kitchens to feed up to 4,000 men. About 2,400 soldiers and sailors already are unloading ships.

Since the government formally seized the dock area, almost 4,000 dock workers have joined the 10,000 who had been on strike.

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Close Races Forecast In Major Leagues

Managers Of Six Clubs Each Predict Pennant Victories Or Ties

The major league pennant races are going to wind up in two triple ties for first place.

At least that's the conclusion one draws after comment from Casey Stengel, Burt Shotton, Joe McCarthy, Connie Mack and other optimistic pilots.

The latest and most surprising skipper to look into the future through rose colored glasses is Joe McCarthy, the usually reticent leader of the Boston Red Sox.

Although weighted down in fourth place, eight and a half games off the pace at the half-way mark, McCarthy insisted that his club "from here in is the team to beat" in the American League race.

"We'll be there or thereabouts at the finish," he said. "Everything has been breaking just right for the Yankees."

The Red Sox really are moving now. They've won seven in a row and are only a game and a half behind the third place Philadelphia Athletics.

Yankee Pilot Differs

Casey Stengel, who has done such an amazing job with the front-running New York Yankees, does not share McCarthy's opinion.

"I have been inclined to think that the Red Sox would provide us with the toughest competi-

tion," Stengel said. "I felt that way even when they languished in the second division. But when we knocked them off five times in a row recently, that finished them. I don't think they can recover."

A week ago Stengel picked the Athletics as the only team that could stop his Yankees, who currently hold a five-and-a-half game edge over the second place Cleveland Indians. At the time, the As were in second place, only four-and-a-half games behind.

"If we can beat the As more times than they beat us, we're in," Stengel said. "If not, it probably will be the As."

Whereupon the Yankees knocked off the Mackmen in a solo contest, and started them on their way to a five-game losing streak.

Mack Still Hopeful
Connie Mack, Philadelphia's 86-year-old manager, is not discouraged, however.

"Our boys, although in third place today, feel they still can win and I, as their manager, have to go along with them, naturally," he said. "Don't count us out. We still have a good chance."

Cleveland's Lou Boudreau did not talk much but grinned knowingly when asked whether he thought he would repeat.

"We're still the champions," he said. "It's up to the others to beat us. And it's not going to be easy. I promise you that."

Burt Shotton, Brooklyn manager, still insists, as he has all season long, that his Dodgers are going to win the National League flag. In this he has the backing of his boss, Branch Rickey. Currently, the Dodgers hold a half-game edge on the St. Louis Cardinals, who have won 35 of their last 50 games.

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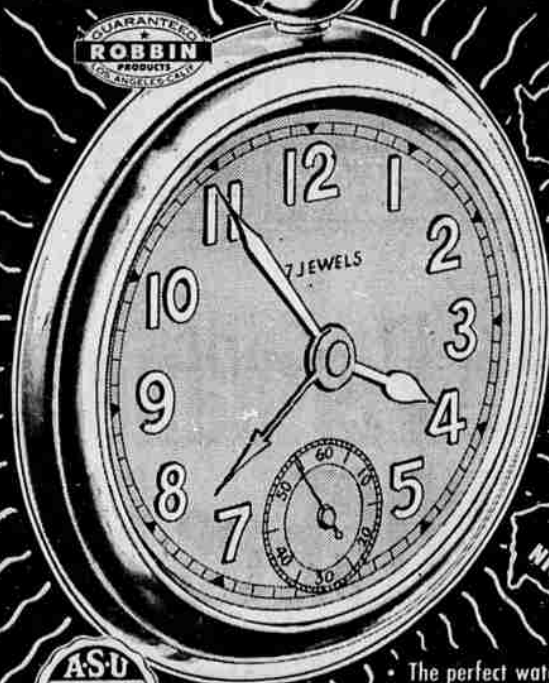
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
