

Globetrotters' Clown Adds Spice To Baseball Games Played By Negroes

Ed Hamman, probably the greatest clown in all sportsdom, will appear as an added attraction with the crack Harlem Globetrotters baseball team when the Negro diamond wonders face the Umpqua Chiefs at Finlay Field tonight in an exhibition contest, starting at 8 o'clock.

Hamman, a white youth, has made a big name for himself traveling with such athletic teams as the Globetrotters, Indianapolis Clowns, Havana La Palomas, Cincinnati Crescents and others in baseball and with the Harlem Globetrotters in basketball.

His hilarious sideshow is known from coast to coast and he is always a welcome appearance because he is constantly adding new stunts and keeps his presentation new and fresh.

Hamman carries a number of props with him to add to his fun-making and has the assistance of members of the Globetrotters to act as his assistants. The players love nothing better than to get "into the act."

The Ohio youth has rejected numerous offers from circuses, theatrical shows and other entertainment enterprises to keep his clowning in sports. This stems from the fact that he long has been associated with baseball as player, manager and team owner and loves the game.



Damages Sought On Assault Claim

Terrance N. Rose has filed suit in Circuit Court to recover damages of \$10,802 for an alleged beating he took at the hands of Knute D. Kershner a truck driver for D. A. Matson, also named as a defendant in the suit.

Rose alleges that on Oct. 22, 1948, while he was driving west on Highway 99 near Azalea, he passed a truck being operated by Kershner. Shortly after he had passed the truck, he stopped his car at the side of the highway and had descended.

He asserts that Kershner then halted his truck, descended, and "while acting in the course of the defendant's business, approached the plaintiff and without warning, cause or provocation, unlawfully and unjustly assaulted the plaintiff with great force and violence." He claims the defendant struck him on the face, head and left clavicle.

Rose stated he had previously suffered a fracture of the left clavicle, a fact the defendant knew, and at the time the defendant struck him the injury had not yet healed and was still wired together and bandaged.

He asks general damages of \$10,000; medical, surgical and hospital care of \$102, and \$700 loss of wages for 10 weeks.

West Coast Riflemen Will Compete In First Regional Matches In Roseburg

The first regional rifle match ever to be held in Roseburg will take place July 30-31, according to Ken Gilkeson, vice-president of the Roseburg Rifle Club.

Top riflemen from the Pacific Northwest and California will vie for honors on the newly-completed National Guard rifle range, located 14 miles east of Roseburg on the North Umpqua road.

Sanctioned by the National Rifle Association, the match will be conducted strictly by the Association's rules and regulations governing such events.

The local range is constructed to handle five riflemen at a time, firing at 200, 300- and 500-yard targets. A field telephone has been installed to expedite communication between the field officer and the target handlers in the pits.

All rifles fired for competition will be the regulation .30 cal. Army type. No admission will be charged for the match and plenty of free parking space will be available, Gilkeson said.

PROCLAMATION
WHEREAS, the unregulated use of certain forest areas is, in my judgment, a menace to life and property on account of an excessive amount of debris on the ground due to old burns and also because of weather conditions, and

WHEREAS, upon the showing of the State Forester, it appears to me to be necessary to close to unregulated use the following area designated as

AREA NO. 4-P — WESTERN LANE — DOUGLAS-COOS FOREST PROTECTIVE ASSOCIATION'S AREA:

Township 19 South, Range 7 West: All sections south of the Siuslaw River except Sec. 34.

Township 19 South, Range 8 West: That portions of all Secs. 3-11 incl.; 13 to 36 incl. lying south and west of the Siuslaw River.

Township 19 South, Range 9 West: Secs. 1, 12, 13, 24, 25; S4 of 26 and 27; all of 34, 35 and 36.

Township 20 South, Range 7 West: Secs. 1 to 24 incl.; and 29 to 32 incl.

Township 20 South, Range 8 West: All of Township.

Township 20 South, Range 9 West: All of east half of Township.

Township 21 South, Range 7 West: All of Township.

NOW, THEREFORE, I, DOUGLAS MCKAY, Governor of the State of Oregon, by virtue of the authority vested in me under the provisions of Section 107-210, Oregon Compiled Laws Annotated, as amended by Chapter 252, Oregon Laws, 1945, do hereby proclaim the unregulated use of the above described areas to be unlawful and that said areas shall be subject to entry only through permit to be issued by the State Forester, or a fire warden, under which permit entrant shall comply with any and all of the following requirements:

(1) To refrain from smoking except in places designated as safe in said permit.

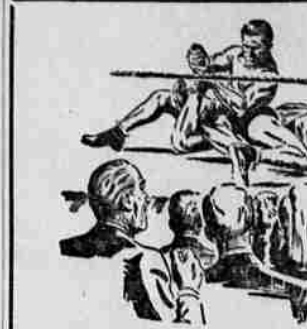
(2) To build no open fires except in places designated as safe in said permit.

(3) To have as a part of his or her equipment, except when traveling as a pedestrian and/or camping at improved, designated and posted campgrounds, tools as specified by the forester suitable for extinguishing fires.

This proclamation shall be effective from and after the 17th day of July, 1949, and shall remain in full force and effect until the 31st day of December, 1949.
