

Social Security Card, When Lost, Easy To Replace

Social security cards sometimes get lost, but it is literally impossible to lose your social security number, according to Paul F. Johnson, manager of the Eugene Social Security Administration office.

"Anyone who has lost his social security account number card can obtain a duplicate card for the asking," Johnson said. "Application blanks are available at all social security offices and most post offices."

"If the worker has the stub of his original card, showing the account number, a duplicate can be issued immediately. Otherwise, we must check our central files for a record of the original number. This takes about 10 days."

The Eugene social security office is located at the Post Office Building, Eugene, Oregon. Applications for original or duplicate account numbers and information concerning old-age and survivors insurance benefits should be directed to that office.

For the convenience of residents in Douglas County, a representative of the Eugene office will be in Roseburg at the Oregon State Employment Service Office on Tuesday, July 19, between the hours of 8:30 a.m. and noon.

Washington Labor Federation Endorses CVA

SPOKANE, July 15.—(AP)—The Washington State Federation of Labor yesterday endorsed in principle the proposed Columbia Valley Administration.

A resolution favoring a CVA provided that federation officers and affiliated councils should analyze all labor provisions of legislation to create a CVA.

The convention passed the resolution a few minutes after James T. Marr, executive secretary of the Oregon State Federation, reported that his group had endorsed the CVA at a recent convention.

"It was the considered judgment of the Oregon delegates that a CVA was necessary if we would have full development of this great basin and its resources," Marr said.

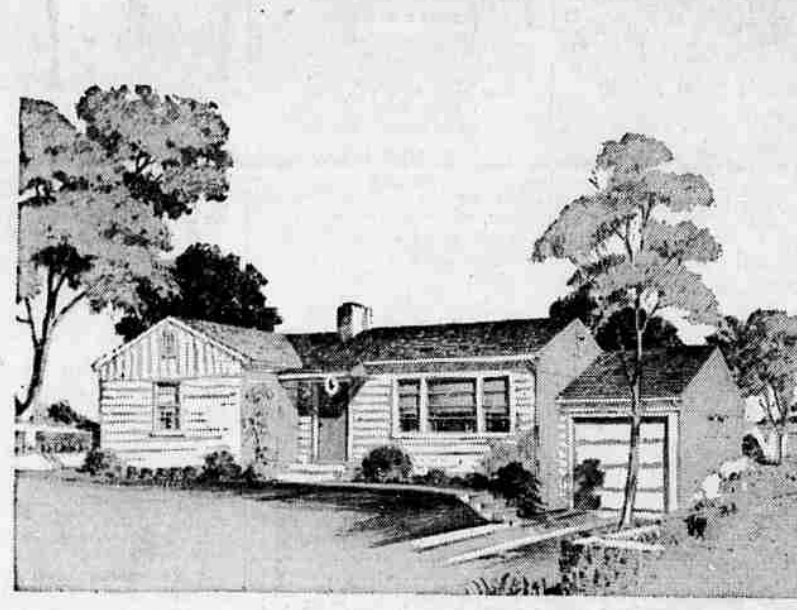
Gladys Telford, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. John Telford of Lookingglass route, graduated from high school this year. She will have charge of nature classes the entire season.

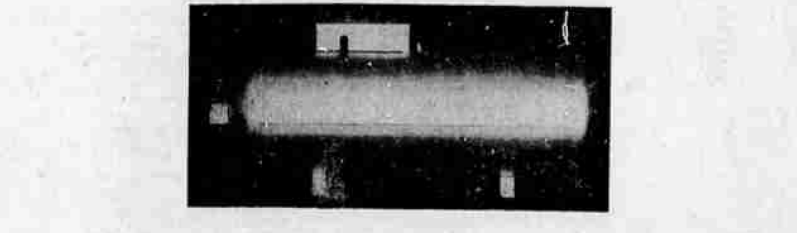
