Russia Exhibits Her Air Power

MOSCOW, July 18.—(P)—Russia celebrated aviation day yesterday by showing off four new planes officially described as "super-speed jet aircraft."

Foreign observers, high Soviet leaders and the general public watched hundreds of fighters and bombers streak across the sky in an impressive display of Soviet air might.

One foreign air attaché said the new jets "seemed extraordinarily fast."

Among the watchers were U. S. Ambassador Admiral Alan G. Kirk and other diplomats, with their military, naval and air attaches.

Rear admiral Leslie C. Stevens, U. S. naval and air attaché, said it was "a very interesting show. Especially noteworthy was the fact that it was restricted completely to modern aircraft. There were absolutely no obsolescent types."

"As usual," the information and acrobatic flying was magnificent."

Prime minister Stalin, who appeared in good health and spirits, watched from the club house veranda at Tushino airfield throughout the two-hour show. His son, Lieut. Gen. Vasily Stalin, commanded the military section of the demonstration.

The Russians demonstrated a tailless glider which did loops, turns and spirals as a crowd of almost 1,000,000 admiring Muscovites watched from the field.

Beware Of Impostors, Boys Town Head Warns

Douglas county residents were warned today to beware of any magazine solicitors identifying themselves with Boys Town, home for abandoned boys, in a letter from the Rev. Msgr. Nicholas H. Wegner, Boys Town director.

According to Father Wegner, "Any magazine solicitor who represents himself as a Boys Town citizen, former citizen, or claims to represent Boys Town in any way, is using the name of Boys Town to promote his own personal ends."

Father Wegner said Boys Town has no authorized representatives selling books or magazine subscriptions and no arrangements have been made with solicitors where by a part of their commissions are turned over to Boys Town. Persons making such use of this scheme should be reported to the local police officials, Father Wegner said.

Ex-State Senator Charles Hall Of Coos-Curry Dies

PORTLAND, July 18.—(P)—Charles Hall, 68, for 16 years an Oregon state senator and three times a candidate for the Republican gubernatorial nomination, died of a heart attack Saturday.

He was a senator from Coos and Curry counties. He ran for the gubernatorial nomination in 1922 and 1930, and in 1934 withdrew after formally announcing his candidacy.

A native of Pennsylvania, he came to Oregon in 1901, taught school and operated a drug store in Columbia county. Later he had a drug store at Hood River and organized the Oregon and Washington Telephone company.

He moved to Coos county in 1914 and engaged in lumbering, shipping and founded another telephone firm. He organized the Bank of Northwest Oregon there in 1917 and in 1921 became president of the First National bank of Klamath Falls.

His public service included memberships in the State Fish and Game commission and the State Land Settlement commission. He was a 32nd degree Mason, a Shriner and member of the Elks lodge.

His widow, Ann, and two daughters and two sons survive. One son is Charles W. Hall, Salem.

He had lived in Portland since 1934 and for the past year had managed the drug store where he collapsed and died.

Migration Of Steelheads Lags

A lag in summer steelhead migration has sportsmen and biologists worried.

Only 782 summer-run steelheads have been tallied at the National Quality Award station on the North Umpqua river at Winchester, according to Ross Newcomb, field biologist in charge of the Umpqua river study. The count is only slightly more than one-half that for the same time last year.

The migration of spring chinook salmon continues, now lagging in only 100 adults in comparison with the same date last year.

Boy Unaware He Killed Friend; Home Is Sought

SAN FRANCISCO, July 18.—(P)—Juvenile authorities hope someone will come forward today with an offer of a home, love and understanding for a seven-year-old boy who killed a man.

Teddy Moreno, housed in the nursery of the juvenile home, is completely unaware that he killed Fred Throckmorton, 67, his grocer friend, Friday.

Juvenile Judge Milton D. Sapiro said the shooting was accidental. There is no thought of punishing the boy, he added. The court just wants a new home for him.

"He comes from a disturbed family," the judge said. The eldest of six children, little Teddy lived with his father and stepmother. His mother abandoned him when he was a baby and nearly four years of his life have been spent in foster homes.

The shooting took place in Throckmorton's store. The boy had been sent there by his stepmother. While the grocer filled an order, Teddy walked behind the counter and saw the gun. He picked it up, apparently thinking it a toy, and he had at home—and pulled the trigger.
