First street was changed to El; Second street to Salmon; Third and Ash streets changed to Trout street; Fourth street changed to Bass; Fifth, Brush and Laurel streets will all bear the name of Perch street, and Sixth street changed to Pike street.

In the south part McClallen street will be changed to place; Woodward, Blakeley, Brockway, Haynes, Sykes, Roberts and Rice streets will all be changed to avenues. Flood and Orcutt streets were changed to Brockway avenue; Spring street was changed to Haynes avenue; Waite street changed to Sykes avenue, Burke and Germond streets changed to the Roberts avenue, and South street changed to Rice avenue. Sheridan street will be known as Mill and Benson street changed to Cobb. Changes in the north part of the city include: Beacon street changed to Beacon place; Bellview street changed to avenue; East and West Second Avenue N. changed to East and West Irving Avenue; Beacon street changed to Beacon place; Park street changed to Wright street; West First street changed to Virginia street; Rowe street changed to Rowe place; W. Third street changed to Dare court; W. Second street changed to Young street.

East and West Third Avenue N. was changed to Ellsworth avenue; East and West Second Avenue N. changed to Irving avenue; East and West First Avenue N. changed to McClintock avenue; Commercial avenue changed to Park avenue. side of the street. He said apparently the gunmen had fled on foot. Doctors at the Hollywood receiving hospital said that Cooper had a 50-50 chance to pull through. He received two shots through the abdomen.

Cohen, who fronts as a Hollywood haberdasher, has had many brushes with the law and several with assassin's bullets. A year ago Harry "Hokey" Rothman, hoodlum associate of Cohen, was slain in Cohen's haberdashery. Police grilled Cohen extensively in the Bugsy Siegel killing of two years ago but nothing ever came of it. Siegel was ambushed as he sat in the luxurious mansion of international playgirl Virginia Hill.

The arrest and quick, secret release of seven Cohen henchmen last April in an assault case touched off the current grand jury investigation which has rocked the Los Angeles police department.

The henchmen were arrested by two rookie policemen soon after they were seen leaving the scene of a beating of a radio shop owner. Higher-ups in the police department are charged with ordering their "hushed-up" release.

Cohen and the henchmen are under indictment for conspiracy in the beating and for plotting to obstruct justice. His trial is pending. Three hours after the shooting all four victims were transferred to Queen of Angels hospital. Cohen winked at reporters as he was carried out on a stretcher.

At the hospital he calmly shelled out a \$1,000 bill, twenty \$100 bills and \$69 in smaller money.

directly his prospective call for funds to rearm western Europe to implement the Atlantic pact on which the Senate votes tomorrow. But in his soldier field speech, he forecast ratification of the pact in line with what he said was "overwhelming" sentiment for it.

It was in this major foreign policy talk that he said of the communistic alliance: "Within the circle of its control today, tensions and conflicts appear to be increasing. It may have temporary triumphs, but in the long run it must either destroy itself or abandon its attempt to force other nations into its pattern."

He told the gaily-attired Shriners the communistic structure is betraying "the fatal weaknesses of all dictatorships." And he forecast the ultimate triumph of democracies in their insistence upon a peace based on a faith which is "more appealing, more dynamic and stronger than any totalitarian force."
