Saving Of U. S. Traditions Urged By National President Of Trails Assn.

The value of Oregon's past to its present and future was the theme of an address delivered at the chamber of commerce meeting Wednesday noon by Dr. Howard R. Driggs, national president of the American Pioneer Trails association.

"We must save old America for young America," Dr. Driggs said in speaking of American tradition and history as an aid in combatting foreign ideologies. "We must put history to work for this country—that will save America," he asserted.

Accompanied by his wife, four New York educators, and Association Secretary Walter Meacham, Dr. Driggs made his initial stop in Roseburg Wednesday while touring the southern portion of the old Oregon trail for the first time.

According to Meacham who introduced the speaker, Dr. Driggs has been speaking at various locations along old pioneer trails since 1937. Before that time, he was a professor of English education at New York university. He has written 37 books, many of them dealing with the history and founding of the West.

Dr. Driggs termed the Oregon trail "one of the outstanding thoroughfares of history" and deplored the lack of interest shown by many of the inhabitants who reside along its borders.

The speaker emphasized the importance of historical areas to local businessmen by relating the story of the restoration of California's Fort Sutter and the annual \$300,000 in tourist trade the city of Sacramento receives as a result. However, Dr. Driggs said he found instances in every state where historical resources have been neglected.

Following Dr. Driggs' address, Meacham challenged the 56 persons present to see that all of the Applegate trail markers are erected in Douglas county. The challenge was accepted by George W. Dimick of Roseburg, regional vice-president of the American Pioneer Trails association.

The visiting party is touring the state in cooperation with the travel information department of the state highway department. Dr. Driggs will continue to tour central Oregon before leaving for a Laraine, Wyoming, celebration.
