Woman Worker Of U. N. Labeled As Red Spy Aide

WASHINGTON, July 26—(AP)—House spy hunters said yesterday a woman employee of the United Nations put herself "in the category of a courier for the Communist Party" while working for the U. S. government.

The Un-American Activities committee tossed that accusation against Mrs. Mary Jane Keeney, 51, of New York. The basis for it was a report apparently written by an FBI agent, that figured in the trial at which Judith Coplon was convicted of taking government documents.

Mrs. Keeney has testified under oath that she never has been a Communist. But the committee said "the FBI relates that two confidential informants have advised them that Mrs. Keeney is a member of the Communist Party."

She and her husband, Phillip, 58, appeared before the committee two months ago. The committee published their testimony Monday, with some comments of its own in a foreword and some excerpts from the FBI reports.

The "courier" report said Mrs. Keeney returned from Europe on March 9, 1946, and on the same day was seen passing a Manila envelope to Joseph Bernstein.

The report said Bernstein was "suspected of being engaged in Soviet espionage." It suggests that he passed the envelope along to Alexander Trachtenberg, a member of the committee as a "high functionary of the Communist Party."

member of the staff of the American representative to the allied reparations commission. When this activity was shifted to the state department, she shifted, too.

The change was made about the time she came back from overseas. Mrs. Keeney resigned from the department in July, 1946, and got a job with U. N. two years later. She is employed there in the document control section of the secretariat.

Her husband was dismissed as a civilian employe of the army in Japan in 1947. He tried to leave this country without a passport last winter.

Both the Keeneys were wartime employes of the Foreign Economic Administration in

Washington and each worked for other government agencies.

Some of the things the committee said about them included: "The Keeneys have made numerous contacts with known Communists in the San Francisco area. . . . The Keeneys' Communist Party activities were not confined to large Communist gatherings but, on the contrary, included many meetings of small groups."

Two Race Drivers Killed In Crashes, Two Others Hurt

Two veteran race drivers were killed and two others injured critically in spectacular crashes on American tracks Sunday.

At Salem, Ind., veteran drivers Tommy Mattson, 32, of Wilmington, Del., and Chick Barbo, 33, of Seattle, were killed when their big racers locked wheels, spun high into the air and crashed on to the top of three automobiles 150 feet away.

Jack McGrath, 29, a top-ranking driver from South Pasadena, Calif., was injured critically in another accident at the Indianapolis midget speedway. McGrath who competed in this year's 500-mile Indianapolis Memorial Day classic, sustained head injuries and a crushed leg when his midget racer hurtled into a retaining wall while trying to make a turn.

At Yakima, Allen E. Hobson, Cornelius, Ore., driver, was impaled on a splintered 10-foot length of 2 by 6 plank when his speeding racer ripped through a fence. The heavy timber pierced the left side of his abdomen. His condition was critical today.
