Roseburg Junior Chamber of Commerce will sponsor a Douglas county swimming meet Sunday, Aug. 21, at the Roseburg pool.

At a dinner meeting of Jaycees last night, it was decided to hold a meet for novice swimmers living in this area, in order to help promote interest in competitive swimming.

Ribbons will be awarded to swimmers placing in the first three positions. The width of the pool will be used rather than the length, in running off the meet.

No team events will be listed. Swimmers are expected to participate from Reedsport, Drain, Roseburg and other points.

The meet will be free to the public.

They trimmed Los Angeles, 5 to 1, in the Pacific coast league's only Monday night game. The win gained the Solons a half game on Hollywood, the idle league-leaders. The Stars are five games in front.

The win was the Solons 18th in their last 21 starts.

Ken Holcomb's arm was the principal reason for the Angels' downfall. The Solon hurler spaced five hits and allowed only one Angel past first base after the first inning.

The Angels pulled a triple play that appeared and then disappeared in a matter of seconds. Umpires Gordon Ford and Pat Orr overruled Umpire Ira Gordon in nullifying the triple-kill.

The disallowed play started when Angel outfielder Clarence Maddern made a going-away catch of Jim Tabor's hard hit ball into deep left. His throw trapped two Solon runners who were going around the bases like mad. Gordon called them out.

However, Ford and Orr ruled that Maddern trapped the ball off the wall and reinstated the runners. Tabor was credited with a hit.

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WEALTH OF NATIONS—Mrs. Georgia Neese Clark, first woman treasurer of the United States, was entrusted with the nation's wealth as she signs her name to a receipt worth \$27,424,541.375.78%. The sum represents the government's currency, cash, and securities. Auditors certified the receipt down to the last two-thirds of a cent. The capital was transferred to Mrs. Clark by Michael E. Slindse, acting treasurer, who watches her sign the receipt in Washington.

Type Of Bathing Suits Rapped By Archbishop

VATICAN CITY, July 26—(AP)—The Archbishop of Genoa warned yesterday that bathing suits worn by men as well as women on Italy's beaches "open the doors to the worst kind of immorality."

The archbishop, Msgr. Giuseppe Ciri, told his priests in a circular letter that "licentious postures and shameless exhibitionism commonly allowed on the beaches, especially the most noted ones, certainly violate moral law."

The letter, published by the Vatican organ Observatore Romano, admonished parents that by exposing their children "to the danger of the worst resorts they ran the risk of committing mortal sin."
