Congress Sidelights

Letters I have received recently from city officials in the Fourth Congressional district indicate pretty clearly that the propaganda drive which was carried on for the recently enacted public housing bill was misleading. Apparently the general impression is that cities large and small in any part of the United States may have government money aid for the construction of houses if such aid is requested. I expect it might be claimed that such an impression is technically correct. But let's take a look at the technicalities. Here is the way the new law operates: City officials must first make a careful study for the purpose of finding out if a federal housing project is needed. Then a local housing authority must be organized under state laws. Next, a survey of housing needs must be conducted. In order to qualify for a federal project the facts developed in the survey must show the number of low income families needing housing. It must also be shown that the incomes of these families are such as to make it impossible for them to pay the prevailing rents for privately owned housing. (Families who can pay 80 per cent or more of the prevailing rental rates cannot qualify.) There are other provisions but these are the most important.

After the required information has been obtained the local housing agency may file a formal application with the Seattle office of the Federal Housing and Home Finance Agency, Section 301 (8) of Title III of the law should be carefully noted also. The first proviso of this paragraph reads: (a) The public housing agency shall fix maximum income limits for the admission and for the continued occupancy of families in such housing.

What this all means is that under certain circumstances a community can qualify for the construction of some of these public housing unit buildings. When completed they may be occupied only by people who do not earn enough income to pay more than 80 per cent of the normal rent. If the head of any such family has the good luck or the extra energy to increase his income—he will have to move his family elsewhere.

This new law represents the first instance that I know of wherein the government singles out the very poor people of a community, places them in one building or a series of similar buildings—and by their very presence as occupants of such buildings brands them as "poor people."

If you feel I have over-stated the case in voicing my opposition to this Administration housing bill, write me and I will gladly send a copy of the law and you can read the wording of it for yourself.

Flood Of Dollars Next Year To Pour Into Pockets Of 16 Million War Vets

WASHINGTON—A tremendous outpouring of dollars will sweeten the pockets of 6,000,000 World War II veterans early next year. The dollars will come from a \$2,800,000,000 dividend kitty, built up in the National Service Life Insurance (NSLI) fund over the past nine years.

The "special dividend" checks will roll out from Washington to the four corners of the globe—wherever veterans are—starting in January. They will reach a rate of 200,000 a day, five days a week.

The average check will be \$175. Veterans will get more or less depending on:

1. Age of the veteran at the time he first bought NSLI.
2. Number of months he kept his insurance in force.
3. Amount of insurance he has (or had).

Every veteran who held some NSLI for at least three months will get some dividend if he applies for it. It is highly probable some veterans never will apply, either because they don't want to or because they won't hear about it. However, the Veterans Administration (VA) will do its best to see that dividend information is sifted into every nook and cranny of the U.S. and abroad (in cooperation with the State Department) through the press, radio, veterans' organizations, post offices, Red Cross and countless other media.

Four Senators Win Seats Over Foes' Contests

WASHINGTON, July 28.—The senate rules committee Wednesday upheld the election of four senators from West Virginia, Texas, Oklahoma and Michigan, whose seating had been contested.

Committee Counsel Turner Smith told a reporter that the committee action is final in the Texas contest between senator Johnson and his defeated opponent, former governor Coke Stevenson, and in the Oklahoma primary contest involving senator Kerr and Gomer Smith, Democrat.

The committee recommended senate adoption of its findings in the contest involving senator Kilgore (D-WVA) and Tom Sweeney, Republican, dating from the 1946 general election, and in the Michigan contest involving Senator Ferguson (R) and former Rep. Frank Hook.

Johnson defeated Stevenson by the close margin of 87 votes in the 1948 Texas primary.

In the West Virginia contest growing out of the 1946 general election Sweeney charged vote buying and other irregularities.

to the veteran at the address he supplies on the form. He then waits for payment. VA estimates it will take six months to complete payment of dividends. It might be done quicker.

This special dividend is the result of two factors:

1. A lower-than-expected mortality rate among veterans after deaths are paid by special apportionments and do not affect the dividend kitty.
2. An out-dated mortality table which does not allow for the

constantly increasing life span but which the law compels VA to use. It is called a special dividend because:

1. It is computed from the date the insurance was purchased to the policy's 1948 anniversary date.
2. It cannot be left on deposit with VA at interest (although a veteran can endorse his check to VA as advance payment of NSLI premiums and this will draw 3 percent interest).
3. It is payable to former, as

well as present, NSLI policy holders. 4. It must be applied for. (In the future dividends can be expected to be paid automatically on an annual basis and may be left with VA at interest also automatically.)

5. Beneficiaries or heirs of deceased veterans are eligible to collect the deceased's dividend, regardless of whether the policy was in force at the time the veteran died. But they need not apply for it. It is to be paid to them automatically.
