WASHINGTON, July 29.— (47)
—The outlook for President Truman's other proposals for a huge expansion of the social security expansion brightened Thursday with a House committee call for restoration of about 750,000 workers of the old age insurance rolls.

The ways and means committee voted 15 to 10. strictly on party lines, to repeal the "Gearhart amendment" enacted by the Republican-controlled 80th Congress.

This amendment, sponsored by former Rep. Gearhart (R-Callt), excluded from the insurance program certain commission salesmen, elife-incurance salesmen, pleceworkers, truck drivers, taxicab drivers, miners, journeymen tailors and others.

Mr. Truman vetoed the Gearhart ways and means democrats voted solidly yesterday to unde that action of the 80th Congress. The 10 republicans stood solidly against the democrats.




