Business Budget Importance Topic Of Accountant

The importance for even small businesses to set up an operational budget was stressed by Irving Alten, staff manager for Edward R. Burt & Co., certified public accountants, Portland, in a talk before the Roseburg Lions club Thursday night in the Hotel Umpqua.

"The maximum effectiveness of a business can be attained only when every department contributes to the whole," he stated.

Setting up of an operating budget means getting control of one's business, and getting control means setting forth what one is trying to accomplish, he explained. An accounting system should set up and present clearly just what each item is.

He defined an operational budget, pertaining to income and expense of operation, in comparison with a financial budget, which sets up the net worth of a concern.

There are four steps in an operational budget, he said. First, the setting up of a goal, which must be within reason. If it is out of reason it must be adjusted. Second, set up the cost of sales, preferably over a 12-month period. Third, set up a sales expense account, relating to advertising, salesman's expenses, etc.; and fourth, overhead, including rent, depreciation, interest and other fixed costs.

The break-even point is very important to know, for it is amount a business must take in in order to break even in its operation.

An operational budget helps in revealing information which the management may not otherwise know.

was bolted, breaking them, and pushing them out of the way. In the meantime, other firefighters had been working to check the flames on the roof of the shed. Workers were busy until about 3 a. m. Friday getting the fire under control.

Machinery of the mill was saved but according to Gray, the owners will not be allowed to rebuild. Twice before the mill was temporarily closed by the Douglas County Forest Protective association because of alleged disregard of fire safety rules. Similar negligence was blamed for the fire which partially destroyed the plant and which might easily have spread into surrounding timber areas.

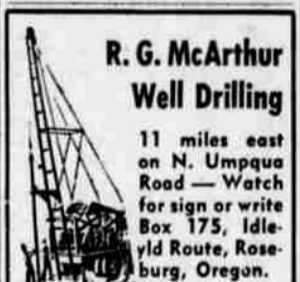
Clifton Sawmill Near Quines Creek Swept By Fire

The Clifton sawmill near Quines Creek was partially destroyed by fire Thursday, July 21, and, because of alleged continued negligence of fire hazards, was permanently closed by order of the southern Douglas county inspector of the Douglas Forest Protective association.

Three young men, Billy Walton, Donny Sloper and Jimmy Booth, discovered and reported the fire in the unattended mill at about 9:40 p. m. They fought it themselves with dirt until Joe Gray, district fire warden, arrived. Gray called the Douglas Forest Protective association, which sent a pumper and crew.

About that time, Floyd Lewis, owner of the land on which the mill is situated, passed on the highway and joined the firefighters already on the scene. Using information supplied by Lewis, Gray called the Wolf Creek fire warden who contacted the owner of the "cats" which had been used at the mill, and the two men drove to the scene.

The "cat" operators shoved piles of burning logs down the hill away from the mill and even backed and shoved at the blazing logs which formed the floor of the mill and to which machinery
