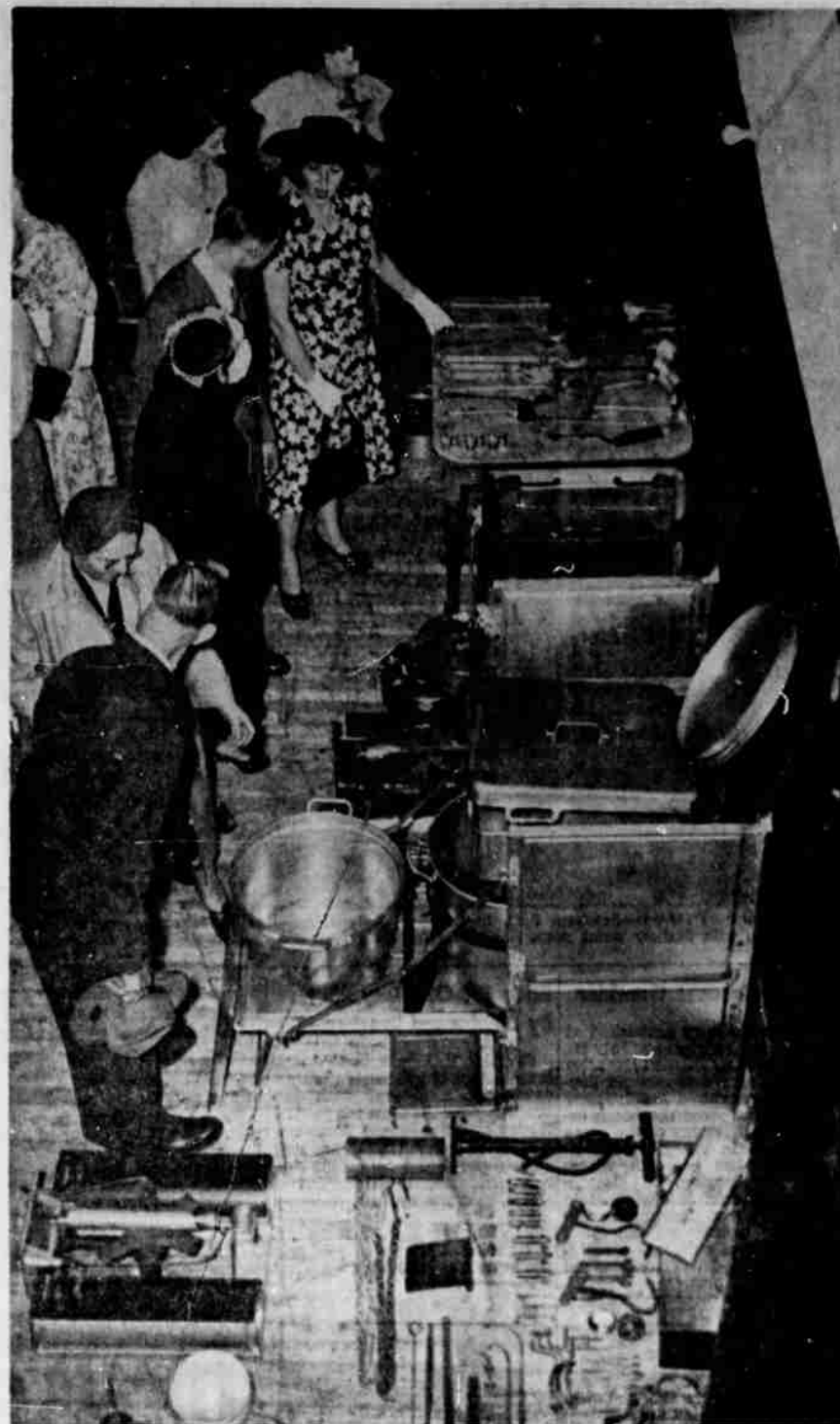

Polio Kills Mother After Caesarian Section

SAN ANTONIO, Texas, Aug. 3. (P) — Polio killed Mrs. Grace Weir, 32, Tuesday shortly after she gave birth to a child by a caesarian section.

The dread disease victimized her son Ronald, 4, and nephew, Bailey Hargis Briscoe, 3, son of Mr. and Mrs. Joe Briscoe.

Mrs. Weir was a twin sister of Mrs. Briscoe, who was visiting in the Weir home from nearby Devine.

Three more city polio cases were reported Tuesday, bringing the total number in San Antonio to 135. Eleven deaths have been reported.

Justice Murphy Leaves Very Small Estate

WASHINGTON, Aug. 3. — (P) — The late Justice Frank Murphy left an estate here of only \$2,100 — and \$1,600 of that is due the Washington hotel where he lived. This was disclosed in papers filed in a District of Columbia court.

George Murphy, the jurist's brother, previously had said that Murphy left only a small estate in Michigan.

Justice Murphy died July 19 in Detroit, without leaving a will. His only survivors are his brother George, a sister, Marguerite Murphy Teahan and a niece, Sharon Murphy. All live in Michigan.
