Two Estates Admitted Here For Probate

The Gates estate, of the probable value of \$3,600 will be administered by Harold Oscar Gates, Camas Valley, son of the deceased. Other heirs include the widow, Jennie C. Gates, Camas Valley, and Henry Homer Gates, Cottage Grove.

William A. Oerding, Mr. Ott, and Ralph Chapman have been appointed by County Judge D. N. Busenark as appraisers of the estate.

The late Mrs. Criteser left an estate of the probable value of \$7,500, including property which brings annual rents of \$300 and personal property valued at \$1,700. Her brother, D. L. Elvingston was appointed administrator by order of Judge Busenark. Her other legal heirs include Ella Ward of Portland, sister, and Frank Livingston, Lake Worth, Fla., brother.

Appraisers of the Criteser estate, as appointed by the court, include G. V. Wimberly, Will Dixon, and Frank Dunn.

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Ousted Men Win N. L. R. B. Ruling

WASHINGTON, Aug. 4.—(AP)—A national Labor Relations board trial examiner ruled today that three Portland, Ore., employers and an AFL union had illegally discriminated against six men.

The examiner ordered that the men—who were fired as machinists and helpers while doing installation work — be paid the wages they would have received for the job.

The six men—members of the Independent Machinists union—were discharged in Sept. 1947, after the AFL Carpenters union Local 1857 demanded that they be replaced by members of the carpenters union.

The trial examiner held that the carpenters did not have a valid closed shop contract. The work involved was installation of machinery in the Volney Felt Mills, Inc., a subsidiary of the Lloyd A. Fry Roofing company. The St. Louis Motor Express company had hired the six men to do the installation.

The NLRB examiner ordered these three companies, the AFL Building Trade council, and the AFL Carpenters' Local 1857, not to interfere with the rights of any employees to self-organization.

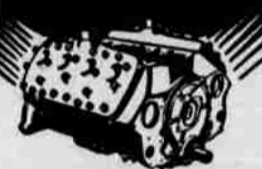
The other Tillie, full name Tillie Bernie Shafer, was arrested Tuesday by sheriff's deputies in a Roseburg tavern.

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
