Draw Taboo, Decision "Must" When Weaver, Hager Clash Saturday For Grappling Title

The coveted Pacific coast light-heavyweight wrestling championship will be at stake again at the Roseburg armory Saturday night. Principals in the match to decide a successor to Ben Sherman will be the same two who thrilled a near-capacity crowd of fans here last Saturday—but resulted in a "no contest" ruling by the Roseburg wrestling commission. They are Buck Weaver, former University of Indiana athlete, and Tex Hager, native Oregonian who will be the prime favorite with most of the Douglas county mat followers.

Fishing Outlook Good in Tidewater Areas

PORTLAND, Aug. 5.—(AP)—Good fishing in tidewater areas was reported by the State Game commission Thursday in its weekly fishing bulletin. The outlook by districts included: Douglas County — Preesport-Searun cutthroat trout are in all major Douglas, Coos, and Curry counties streams. Salmon fishing at Winchester Bay fair to good. Roseburg — Upper Umpqua area water conditions generally good, occasional murkiness. Trout fishing has been tops here since it was taken.

Last week Hager was helped to the dressingroom almost unconscious after being tossed from the ring and into the ringside by Weaver. This action resulted in a commission ruling that ordered the two grapplers to meet in a re-match, and the action was backed by every other commission in Oregon after Weaver threatened to take the tilt elsewhere. The would-be villain failed to realize that the Roseburg commission holds possession of the championship belt.

The match should be a rugged affair in which both men may be forced to resort to fistic action. Regardless of the trend of action, a new champion is certain to be crowned. There will be no draw because the commission has announced that either a decision will be made after the full hour of hostilities, or the matmen will be ordered to continue until a deciding fall has been registered.

Two Other Bouts
Attracting almost as much interest will be a semi-final three-fall skirmish between the Yaqui Kid and Tony Ross. Local wrestling fans are unaware of the rivalry between the two matmen. The popular youngster from the Sonora mountains of Mexico defeated Ross in a recent engagement and the Salem man claimed he was given a dirty deal on the decision because the Indian youngster has a following of the fans. He will seek revenge.

Another Mexican, Salvador Flores, will meet Leo Karlinko in a special one-fall opening engagement. Karlinko, the "Mad Russian" is extremely unpopular with local fans and Flores will have the backing of most of the cash customers. The bout opens the program at 8:30 p.m. One of the largest crowds in local mat history is anticipated for this three-star program. Selection of the referee will not be announced until match time.
