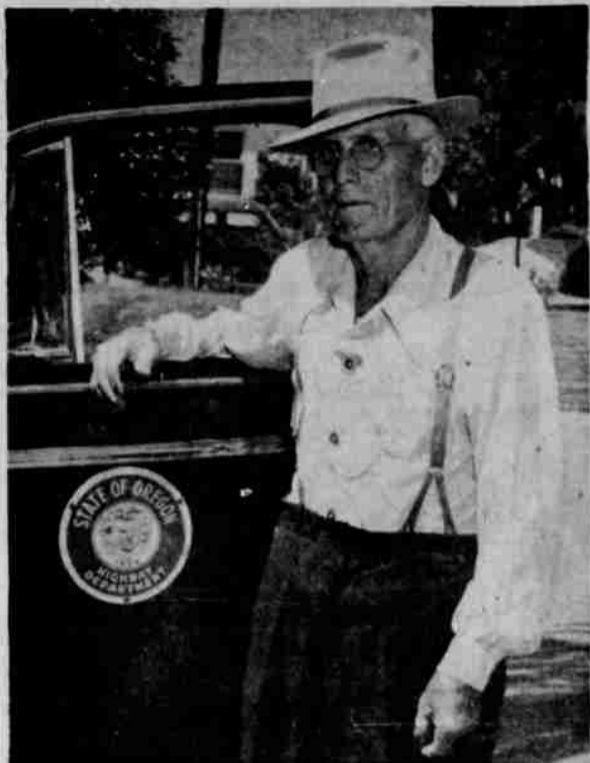
EVERGREEN GRANGE TO MEET FRIDAY

Henry Erskine Retires From State Highway Department After Service Of 28 Years

After 28 years service with the State Highway department, Henry Erskine has come to the conclusion that "you can't work for a better outfit." That's the advice he would give a young man with the choice of a career ahead of him.

Erskine, a maintenance foreman, has come to the end of his service with the state. He was retired Saturday and now, at his home at 909 Cobb street, "I'm going to do as I please," he said.

A native of California, raised in Red Bluff where his father operated the Railroad hotel, Erskine has "worked from the time I was seven years old," so he doesn't plan to be idle in retirement.

Besides having a large garden to care for and a house to paint, Erskine spends time at his little river summer camp, 30 miles east of Roseburg, which he leases from the government. He also owns a ranch south of Roseburg. Once Coal Miner.

While Erskine was still young, his parents moved from California to Medford. Eventually he went to Portland. During World War I he worked in the coal mines for the Oregon-Washington Railroad and Navigation company at Messner, Ore. Also, during his varied career, he operated a street car in Portland.

But he's gotten the greatest satisfaction from his job with the state, because it has given him an opportunity to do construction work, which he enjoys.

Seven years ago, when a chapter of the Oregon State Employees association was organized here, Erskine was elected first president of the local group.

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Filipino President Asks Congress Aid To Stem Communist Tide In Asia

WASHINGTON, Aug. 10.—(AP)—Philippine President Elpidio Quirino Tuesday urged the United States to support a non-military Pacific union once it has been formed to help prevent Asia from being lost to communism "by default."

Quirino, here on an official visit as guest of President Truman, voiced his plea for U. S. assistance against the "advancing tide of communism" in a speech before the Senate.

He also spoke before the House. The major part of his senate speech was devoted to the Pacific union idea in which the Philippine chief executive has taken the initiative.

The idea got rolling about three weeks ago when Quirino and Chinese nationalist leader, Chiang Kai-shek discussed a possible Pacific pact against communism in the Far East. Chiang is now in southern Korea talking over the same plan with Korean President Rhee.

H. D. Scudder, Former OSC Instructor, Dies

PORTLAND, Aug. 10.—(AP)—H. D. Scudder, 67, faculty member at Oregon State college for 38 years, who retired in 1945 as professor of agronomy, is dead.

He once had charge of all agricultural experiment stations in the state and was connected with the Federal Land bank.

He died at his farm home near Sheridan Monday, three weeks after suffering a stroke. Surviving are the widow; a son, Robert D. Scudder, Crescent City, Calif.; and a daughter, Mrs. Vern D. Mathis, Portland.

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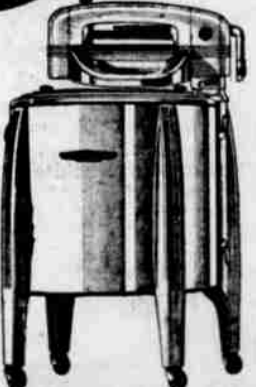
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
